

## Five region road projects running out of bucks

works projects started by Halton Region are running out of money.

That is among the revelations about Halton's financial operations uncovered in a recent letter the external auditors. Members of the ad-

ministration and finance committee were told additional financing for the projects will have to be found before they can be finlshed.

The projects, including expansion of the Oakville water filtration plant, addition to the Guelph Line Reservoir and Georgetown Water Pollution Control Plant, are unfinanced because of a number of reasons the auditors said.

Among these reasons, are changes in the way the federal government capital grants, funds delays in filing applicafor grants by regional staff, interest costs and funding restraints by senior levels of government.

Jim Stewart, acting regional treasurer, said the projects would require the issuing of addidebentures order to raise the required funds.

In total, the projects an additional \$793,000. They were originally budgeted at \$10.1 million.

A further \$80,000 must be found to complete construction of the Skyway Water Pollution Control Plant, the letter noted, although this amount should be found in the contributions capital
