Accepts Scouter post

Acton resident Bob Barber recently accepted a post as Provincial Scouter in Toronto. Actively involved in the Scouting movement since he was a Boy Scout himself, Barber will be training to be a provincial field executive. It is a full-time paid position. Originally from Georgetown, Barber has been actively involved in scouting as a leader and Assistant District Commissioner and will be resigning from his post as District Commissioner for North Halton.

Trial by jury

Robert Marshall Esplen of Halton Hills, charged with manslaughter in the death of Andre Wysman, 22, of Milton has been bound over for trial by judge and jury.

The decision was made by Provincial Judge Douglas Latimer after a preliminary hearing into the charge.

Mr. Wysman was shot while he and two others were fishing at a pond on private property. He died 14 hours after the shooting in Milton District Hospital.

Copper coils stolen

Five to six hundred pounds of scrap copper coils were reported stolen from the Hydro office on Alice Street.

The incident was reported to police Monday morning. The coils are valued at \$375.

House break-ins

Halton Regional Police were called to two Acton homes Tuesday after thieves broke in. Police say thieves gained entry to the home of Douglas Pratt, 10 Clare Court, by climbing the TV tower and breaking a window. The home was ransacked but nothing was reported missing.

Thieves also entered a residence at 81 Churchill Road the same day through the front window. Nothing was stolen.

Surprise visitor

Halton Regional Police have a brief description of a thief after a Jeffrey Street resident came home to find his home broken into and the thief escaping. Police say a small amount of cash was stolen.

SLOW DOWN

Flying radar squads

Halton Regional Police faced with statistics that show more fatalities till the end of September than the entire 12 months last year, will soon have flying radar squads on the road all over Halton.

Although the overall number of accidents is down 10 per cent over last year, the number of fatal accidents has increased with 22 so far, up two over last year's total of 20.

Deaths in the fatalities total 29 so far for the first 10 months of this year compared to 23 killed over 1979.

A police spokesman says speed in usually the reason for fatalities and the cure means slowing motorists down. As a result the deputy chief has formed three radar squads available to concentrate on any one area of Halton with short notice.

The squads will blitz one area for speeders and then move to another location when police feel traffic is moving normally.

"No matter where you go they're likely to get you," (if you're speeding) a police spokesman said.

"Forewarned is forearmed," he said. The radar squads will converge on Halton Hills in their blitz but the time and date will be known only to the officers in charge.

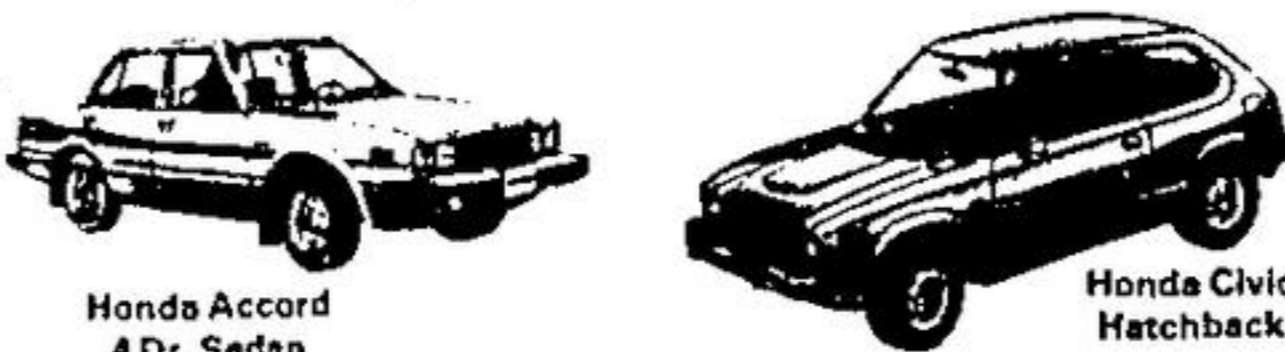

PROPOSED WASTE DISPOSAL SITE FOR LANDFILLING

Regional Municipality of Halton
Town of Milton

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment has received an application by the Regional Municipality of Halton for approval of a proposed waste disposal site for landfilling to be located on Part of Lots 6 and 7, Concession VII, New Survey, Geographic Township of Nelson, County of Halton now in the Town of Milton, Regional Municipality of Halton, more particularly in Parts 1 to 6 inclusive, on Plan 20-R-4617 for Registry Division of Halton (20). The proposed site is known as Site "E".

The Environmental Assessment Board will conduct a public hearing to obtain information and to hear the views of the public so that it can make recommendations in respect of the proposed waste disposal site. Written and oral submissions may be made to the Board at the hearing. The Board will not consider any submissions regarding the proposal after the hearing has been closed.

The hearing will be held on October 15, 1980, at 10:00 o'clock in the morning, local time, in the Auditorium, Halton Centennial Manor, 185 Ontario Street South, Milton, Ontario.

Plans of the proposed waste disposal site will be available for examination and inspection during normal business hours in the office of the Clerk of the Regional Municipality of Halton, 1151 Bronte Road, Oakville, Ontario, in the office of the Clerk of the Town of Milton, 261 Main Street East, Milton, Ontario, and in the office of the Environmental Assessment Board, 5th Floor, 1 St. Clair Avenue West, Toronto, Ontario M4V 1K7.
