Crop damage, accidents prompt deer hunt

Widespread crop damage and hundreds of deer-vehicle highway collisions annually have prompted the opening of a controlled deer hunt late this fall in a 32,000 acre area between Brampton and Cambridge, which includes North Halton.

With the support of local officials and farmers, Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources staff will hold the hunt November 3, 4 and 5 in four zones that include the northern two-thirds of Halton Region and the neighbouring Townships of Puslinch and Flamborough.

Only 935 hunters using shotguns and muzzle-loaders, but not dogs, will be allowed to hunt by special permit in the area.

Preference will be given to farmers and landowners resident in the controlled hunt zones. All others will have to enter a draw conducted by the Ministry. Three-quarters of the allocated permits will go to zone residents.

Permits to be attached to valid 1980 Ontario Resident or Farmer's Licences are valid for only one zone, are not transferable and entitle the holder to only one deer, with or without antlers.

The reason for the special deer hunt? "There are just too many deer" said Gary Tupling, Cambridge District Fish and Wildlife Supervisor.

"Last year alone, almost 400 deer were killed in road accidents, it was just good luck that occupants of the vehicles were not also injured or killed."

But Tupling said the controlled hunt is mainly in response to bitter complaints from the Halton Region Agricultural Committee. Members have reported extensive damage to crops, trees and orchards from grazing herds of deer.

"One landowner complained that deer have killed 200 fruit trees on his property."

Deer numbers have steadily increased ever since the regular hunting season was closed 13 years ago. Deer hunting with bow and arrow is allowed, but has done little to thin the herd and ease problems.

Farmers and ministry staff are also concerned that diseases such as leptospirosis may be spread to cattle from deer if deer herd numbers remain high and continue to increase.

Finally, Tupling said legitimate local sportsmen were upset. Evidence indicates that poachers are taking many deer. Meanwhile, real hunters who favour a gun season are being denied recreation.

Nancy Tilt, Cambridge District Biologist, and Robyn Mulholland, the Biologist co-ordinating the controlled hunt, said Ministry staff will be out in force to make sure irregularities don't occur during the hunt.

"Trespassing will not be tolerated," said Mrs. Tilt. "Hunters are being instructed to contact landowners well before the season begins to make sure they have permission to hunt on private land."

As proof they are bona fide, farmers or landowners resident in the controlled hunt area must present either a valid farmer's licence or sign an affidavit supplied by the ministry.

A "landowner" is anyone who owns or rents and lives on at least 50 acres in one parcel that is located in a controlled hunt zone.

Nassagaweya: Wellington County wants us

Wellington County is ready to welcome Nassagaweya "with open arms" according to Elva Newton of the Nassagaweya Residents Association who made the statement during a boisterous meeting held in Brookville School last Wednesday.

In fact, the group has been invited to appear before Wellington County Council Oct. 29 at which time they will express their desire to leave Halton and Milton and join Wellington, "where we will be among our peers."

Nassagaweya is the northern portion of the Town of Milton.

To do this, Mrs. Newton said, Nassagaweya residents must have a petition of 800 names (50 per cent of the rate-payers) and they must have it into the Wellington Clerk's office by Oct. 20.

Such a petition was

passed around at the meeting last Wednesday where there were about 60 people in attendance.

She said she has talked with the Warden of the County and said he indicated "Wellington" could be opened up to let us in. "He felt we would be most welcome."

Save farmland plea

Halton's planners and politicians should do more to prevent subdivisions being built in good farming areas, says a local agriculture expert.

Encroachment, into these areas drives up land prices and leads to complaints about the urban arrivals about normal farm practices going on around them, said Ed Segsworth, president of the Halton Federation of Agriculture.

"If we don't allow subdivisions in industrial areas, why should we let them in an area where the agriculture industry is located?" he asked.

The local expert feels there are a lot of places besides farming areas in Halton that can be used for subdivisions.

However, good land for agriculture is also preferable for building houses because basements can be dug out with fewer problems, Mr. Segsworth said.

Protection of farmland against other development was spelled out in a report completed recently as part of a Rural Development Outreach Project done

through Guelph University.

The study of Agriculture in Halton is part of a three-part program to make officials in the region aware of local farmers' concerns.
