In case you are wondering what's being built in the Ball Park-no, it's not a swimming pool. Look carefully and you'll see a well-finished ditch running from the corner of Inkerman and Guelph Streets, along Inkerman from the front of the park clear to the bush along the Clara Street

The township is rerouting the natural water course which for the past 13 years has careened down Clara Street gardens. Spring runoff coupled with increased building in the area plus the hockey rink drainage has been creating a miniwaterfall in some hill-side gardens. At residents' request, the ditch was dug thereby saving both gardens and tempers. Residents said there were pleased with the job and feel it will do the trick in diverting runoff.

Eramosa Pee Wees have received their trophy for winning All Ontario Rural Softball Association championships this year and celebrated by posing for pictures recently in the ball park. Proud moms and dads used up rolls of film as the talented young lads lined up behind five of their six trophies.

In addition to the ORSA trophy, they won the Rockwood Pee Wee championship trophy at the Rockwood tournament; a trophy for the Baden tournament; the championship trophy for Acton tournament; and the Tri-county Pee Wee trophy.

An impressive list for the team who took time out to congratulate and thank coaches Aleck Lush and Vic Willms, Linda Lush, scorekeeper and team "mother" was presented with a bouquet of carnations.

The team played 40 games and lost only one. Must have been some kind of record.

Rural Rockwoodites who still have livestock out in the fields at night had better consider bringing them indoors to sleep (in the barn, that is). There are reports of wolves in Nassagaweya a mile south of Highway 7 between Fourth and Flith Lines

Bernle Metheral, R.R. 2 Rockwood on the Fourth Line, reports seeing a large timber wolf kill a deer 200 feet from his property line

He says it was 8.30 a.m. when he noticed a young confused deer dashing out of the woods opposite the Metheral 10-acre property. The deer, which turned out to be a spring doe fawn of approximately 125 pounds, was unable to jump the fence next to Metheral's property. It became very excited. In the same instant a large wolf sprang out of the bush, according to Metheral and killed the young doe with one swipe. The wolf then carried it 300 feet to a small knoll. Metheral ran into the house to fetch his rifle but the wolf disappeared when he reached the knoll, leaving the carcass with its stomach mutilated.

The incident was reported to authorities. Other area residents say they hear wolves howling frequently. Doug and Carla Wood, Fifth Line, report they have heard large packs of wolves howling. The Woods say they are told there's a den living on the bush property next to

Long time resident Vincent Synnot of Fourth Line, says he's seen evidence of wolves for years and feels they are worse than ever this year. He saw a large timber wolf "five or six" years ago in the Teske bush between his farm and the Wood's on the Fifth line. He is convinced wolves have been after his cattle this year even though he hasn't lost any yet.

Metheral comments he often sees wolves at night when he's travelling home from work late.

"They're good looking timber wolves," he adds. Mo McGinnis, farmer in the area since 1964, says he's aware of wolves and coyotes in the area but "I never worry about them little things," he scoffs but goes on to say "I wouldn't want to argue with any of them.

"He's come within three feet of big timber wolves when he's been out riding and says he knows there're wolves on the Teske property.


He feels all wildlife is getting pushed closer to man as cover areas are civilized. He says the decrease of hunting rights has increased the amount of deer which in turn has attracted wolves.

He also feels seeding of nearby creeks with beaver several years ago by the Department of Lands and Forests has done damage.

Beavers have flooded land, creating swampy areas and promoting undergrowth which provide perfect wolf cover.

"The oldtimers had a reason to get rid of beavers," he comments. Whatever the reason, keep your lambs and

kids indoors at night. No sense encouraging wolves with easy dinners.
