## Three-way stops Churchill North

It took a long time but the town fathers have finally approved three-way stops for two locations on Churchill Road North to help reduce speeding.

Monday Halton Hills general committee approved a recommendation from deputy engineer Ted Ballinger calling for three-way stops at Churchill and Norman Avenue and Churchill and McDonald Boulevard.

Back in the spring residents complained about speeding on the street, requested stop signs and council referred the matter to staff for a report.

During the summer staff recommended a

reduced speed limit, school crossing signs and crosswalks on both Churchill and Acton Boulevard but no stop signs.

Last month residents came to council asking that stop signs again be considered.

Ballinger's report observes there is a speeding problem on Churchill and there are a lot of children walking on Churchill to McKenzie-Smith, M.Z. Bennett and Acton High Schools.

He pointed out

residents, the police and M. Z. Bennett principal Doug Magwood are all concerned about the situation and the safety problem.

In addition to three-way stops the staff has recommended four signs warning of the new stops be placed on Churchill too.

Traffic volumes on Churchill are estimated at 1,000 cars a day and police admit there is a regular speeding problem which they can't

control without full-time radar enforcement. Police recommended the three-way stops as the only possible solution to the speeding problem. They think it will slow traffic down at intersections where children cross the street and reduce traffic volumes on Churchill.

Ballinger warned stop signs aren't that effective but will likely slow traffic somewhat at the intersections. Ballinger said stop signs probably won't

reduce traffic volumes or reduce speeding between Peel Street and Norman. He also warned of the possibility of more accidents on the street at Norman and McDonald.

He urged the council approve stop sign ahead signs and an oversized stop sign or a stop sign with a flashing red light above it may be needed for the southbound stop sign at Norman.

With parking already banned on the west side of Churchill from Queen Street to McDonald staff could see no reason to impose further no parking restrictions.

Ballinger said the town may need to move a new crosswalk near Norman. If it is moved it should be placed right at the intersection and a 300 foot sidewalk would have to be built on the west side of Churchill from Norman south to the school grounds.
