

Visiting Salvation Army official finds his roots

A meeting in Acton in 1885 between the Salvation Army and an early Limehouse resident changed the course of life for several generations of Marshalls.

Commissioner Norman S. Marshall, who is in charge of Salvation Army operations in North and South America, and his wife, were honored Thursday at a civic luncheon and then taken to Limehouse where he saw two houses where members of his family have lived.

The stop in Acton and visit to Limehouse were the highlight of an 18 day visit to Canada by Commissioner Marshall, who resides in London, England.

He was thrilled to visit his roots and see where his families four generations of involvement with the Salvation Army began.

William Marshall, Commissioner Marshall's great, great grand-

father, lived in Aughton, Lancashire, England where his great grandfather William was born. Great grandfather William brought his family from England to Canada and settled in Limehouse where he farmed and later ran a market in Acton.

His son Stephen, Commissioner Marshall's grandfather, was born in Limehouse and as a teenager helped his father in the store before heading west in early 1880s.

Soon Stephen returned to Acton and opened his own store with a partner who a few years later headed for the United States.

In January, 1885, Stephen met some members of the first Salvation Army corps in Acton and by the summer became an officer in the Salvation Army and wound up serving with distinction in various centres across Canada and the United

States.

Stephen Marshall had seven children, five of whom became officers in the Salvation Army, including Commissioner Marshall's father, also named Norman.

Waldron, who is in charge of Canada and Bermuda, said he expects the new building should be opened within a year.

Following the luncheon another service was held in front of one of two homes on the sites of Marshall clan homes in Limehouse.

Commissioners Marshall said the visit here was the highlight of his trip and noted how glad he was his grandfather Stephen became involved in the Salvation Army. He also met four relatives while visiting here; aunts Edwena Fenn and Eileen Marshall, both formerly of Limehouse, and cousins Bob Marshall, who lives near Acton, and Hazel McMillan of Hamilton.

He said with pride that at one time or another 22 people from "Stephen's stock" have served as officers of the Salvation Army. Stephen achieved the rank of Colonel before his death in 1942.

"The incident of Stephen meeting the Salvation Army in Acton was a very significant event both for the Marshall clan and the Salvation Army," he declared.

The Salvation Army is growing rapidly throughout the world, especially in Canada, as evidence by Acton having an 18-month-old corps after the Salvation Army folded here during the depression.

Many of its services are non-denominational and in fact the Salvation Army is the largest private social service agency in the world.

In 87 countries, the Salvation Army has about 4 million members.

Marshall said he will certainly be returning to Limehouse and Acton when he retires for at least a visit and may possibly take up residence here.

Dental program said needed now

The supply of preventive dentistry programs in Halton needs substantial upgrading if it is to reach Ministry of Health standards, according to Councillor Carol Gooding.

Mrs. Gooding, in a report on "Gaps in the Delivery of Health and Social Services" said "no treatment is now being provided" in terms of a public health dental program.

She noted the Region will have to "catch up" to be within recent provincial guidelines.

A school prevention program would have to reach into higher grades, at least up to Grade 10.

"There is a need to provide dental programs for infants, a senior citizen preventive clinic, and a central clinic for marginal income people of all ages," she said.

NAMES NOT ON POLLING LIST

Any person who has qualified to have his name entered on the polling list during the period of enumeration (September 2nd, 1980 to September 20th, 1980) and finds that his name is not entered thereon or who has not filled the necessary forms to have his name entered during the period for corrections to the list (ending October 22nd, 1980) can attend at my office to secure a certificate which will allow his name to be entered at the polling station. In addition to this, qualified electors may be entitled to have their name added to the list at the polling station on polling day.

Qualified Elector means a person who during the period of September 2nd, 1980 to September 30th, 1980 was a Canadian Citizen or other British Subject, a resident of Milton or a non-resident owner or tenant or a spouse thereof and has attained the age of 18 years by November 10th, 1980.
