Gibson also said disrupted postal service may have been the cause but the Acton post office was "terrific" in getting responses to the Toronto-based firm.

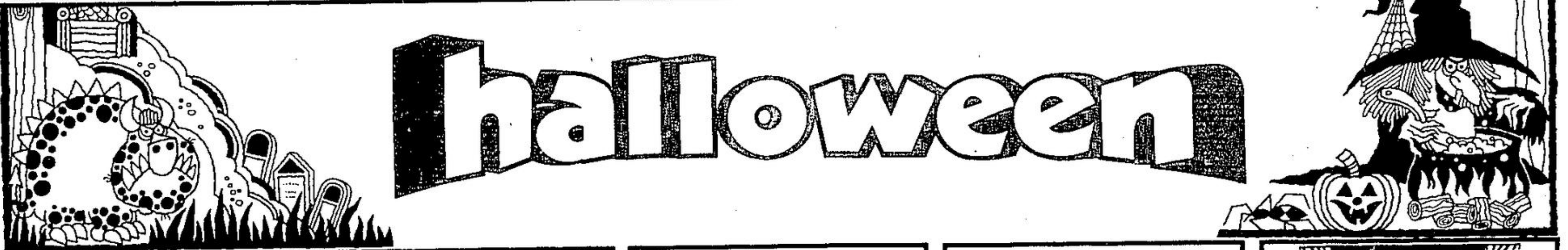
Since the beginning of September they have received 12 to 15 ad-
