

# Nassagaweya meeting

It was a case of bad timing Monday night at the Ward Three all-candidates meeting sponsored by the Nassagaweya Residents Association.

The meeting was in conflict with the regularly scheduled Milton Council meeting, allowing no opportunity for incumbent Don McMillan, Mayor. Don Gordon and mayoralty candidate Gord Krantz to address the rural voters.

Mikki Goutouski, a new face in local politics, took exception to the conflict and refused to speak to the assembled crowd of about 60 residents. She felt the meeting could have been scheduled at a more convenient time to accommodate the Ward Three incumbent and the mayoralty candidates who were conspicuous by their absence.

The remaining four candidates, Roy Galloway, Jim Watson, Robbie Laird and Bonnie Elva Newton took advantage of the opportunity to speak.

Mr. Galloway, a Nassagaweya resident for nine years said he wants to be part of the community. Although he sympathizes with the Nassagaweya Residents Association and urged the group to continue, he admits he is not in favor of the former township of Nassagaweya becoming part of Wellington County, as is the current aim.

He said he would fight for what is needed in Nassagaweya at the local level, winning points for Nassagaweya while working with the other councillors.

After a two-year absence from the local political scene, Jim Watson with 12 years of political service behind him stated his concerns with the proposed relocation of Milton's municipal offices from Main St. to the court house and jail complex on Brown St. He sees the move as a useless expense which could cost the town millions of dollars.

He described rural area police protection as atrocious. He recommended fire engines be located at the station in Campbellville Lions Club facilities.

According to Robbie Laird, there is only one issue in Ward Three. This issue is local concerns and problems between rural and urban areas. He said he supports the

Nassagaweya Residents Association sympathetically, and his signature is on the Association's petition which will be presented by MPP Julian Reed to Tom Wells, calling for an investigation into the region's financial deficit.

Bonnie Elva Newton, chairman of the Nassagaweya Residents Association, was last to address the gathering. She cited taxation as the major issue, with rural autonomy second in her priorities.

She compared the combination of rural and urban areas with trying to mix oil and water, an impossible blend.



About 400 youngsters took part in last week's annual cross-country meet which was hosted by Rockwood's Centennial School. Teams from a number of schools, including Erin, Aberfoyle, Drayton, Elora, Arthur and Guelph took part. The girls had to run 2.5 kilometers while the boys had to run one kilometer more.

AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE ABOUT ONTARIO PROPERTY TAX GRANTS

Waiting For Your Grant?

• If you sent in your Property Tax Grant application but haven't received your grant, please be patient. Many of the applications which contained incomplete information or arrived late because of postal disruptions are still being processed. **IT'S NOT NECESSARY TO CALL ABOUT YOUR GRANT.** A large number of seniors have already been contacted in this regard. The remainder will be contacted or have their grants paid by **NOVEMBER 30, 1980**

Turning 65?

• If you reached or will reach age 65 between July 1 and December 31, 1980 and are just becoming eligible for the Old Age Security Pension, you may be eligible for Ontario Tax Grants for all of 1980 Property Tax Grant applications and Sales Tax Grants will be **AUTOMATICALLY** mailed to you **BY JANUARY 1981**.

Not Eligible for OAS?

• If you are a senior who has not resided in Canada long enough to qualify for the Old Age Security Pension, you may still be eligible for these grants. You should contact the Ministry of Revenue as soon as possible for an eligibility form.

Reminder

• If your principal residence throughout 1980 is a nursing home, home for the aged, chronic care facility, charitable institution, home for special care or other similar institution, you are not eligible for the grant unless the institution in which you reside pays municipal and school taxes and your rent payments are not government subsidized.  
• Applications for the 1980 grant can be submitted any time before December 31, 1981.
