

New Sabres bury past records

The Acton Sabres enjoyed a rare week-end off in midst of a hectic Junior B hockey schedule. They were relaxing after picking up their sixth win of the year Friday night as they overpowered Orillia 5-3.

The Sabres pulled within one point of fifth place last night (Tuesday) when they racked up yet another victory. This time Vic Johnson Arena was the place and the Streetsville Derby's were victims of a 6-4 Acton conquest.

The victory gives the Sabres 14 points, so far this season, seven wins, six losses and a tie—only one point behind Orillia and Oak Ridges.

Sabre action continues Friday night when the swordsmen battle Georgetown at the community centre.

The last time these two cross-town rivals met, fireworks went off. Both Fung and Dollman received game misconducts and automatic two-game suspensions. Fighting broke out in the crowds as well as on the ice.

The Sabres, by the way, won the game quite handily 10-3.

They have a home game slated for next Wednesday, when the Burlington Cougars come to town.
