Fewer dogs destroyed Halton Hills Animal Control department is impounding more dogs and yet destroying fewer this year. A report to council shows that through the end of September the Animal Control department has picked up 429 dogs, compared with 413 in the first nine months of 1979. However, only 221 were destroyed or used for medical research compared with 239 during the same time period last year. The reason fewer dogs are being destroyed would appear to be more are being re-

claimed by owners.

NHAMR presentation The Halton Developmental Centre was established in 1976 through a joint effort by Burlington, North Halton and Oakville Associations for the Mentally Retarded, W.H.A.M.R. to serve Halton. They continue to provide special programs for 5 to 18 year old children who are severely or multi-handicapped.

On November 10, N.H.A.M.R. will be showing an audio-visual presentation about the centre and the audience will be able to talk with the Director, Dennis Tessmer. This will take place at the St. Joseph's hall, which is located on Church Street at the corner of John St., Acton.

Dumping problem The region is urging area municipalities like Halton Hills to prosecute people who dump garbage along the sides of roads in Halton. Council is reviewing steps municipalitles can take to solve the growing problem. Besides asking towns to "take all necessary steps to prosecute, when and if possible", posting of signs warning of hefty fines for dumping at the most popular spots around the region is also being considered.
