

The mother and son team of Eve and Kenneth Jorgenson, partners in the Wooden Heart, have been in the business for a total of 42 years.

Mrs. Jorgenson has been involved in restaurants for 30 years while Mr. Jorgenson, who is the chef at Wooden Heart, has been a chef for 12 years at two different hotels on the Airport Strip, the stately Banff Springs Hotel on a number of occasions and just recently at Langly Golf Course in Langley, British Columbia.
