Acton's war dead remembered

Acton's war dead were remembered at a special Remembrance Day service at the cenotaph Sunday morning.

Led by parade marshal Hugh O'Rourke and the Acton Citizens' Band, Legion and Ladies' Auxiliary members, cubs, scouts, guides, brownies and pathfinders, Halton Regional Police, members of "C" Company of the Lorne Scots, Acton volunteer firefighters and representatives of participating organizations carried a variety of flags in the color party.

The Legion Charge was given by President Pat Waldie and Ab Irwin read the names of the organizations whose representatives laid nearly 30 wreaths at the cenotaph.

John McHugh read the names of those who gave their lives in combat while George Elliott played the Last Post and Revellie. The Citizens' Band played the hymn "Abide with Me" and Legion Padre Rev. John Robertson offered prayer and the benediction before the parade attended the Remembrance Day service at Trinity. Legion members Vic Patrick and Ed Footitt both gave readings at that service and the Citizens' Band played several times. World War I veteran Billy Middleton and Mark Manuel, 6, lit the peace candle while the band played "Sunset".

Legion members also participated in the Remembrance Day service at Nassagaweya cenotaph near Brookville.

There was a Remembrance Day luncheon at the Legion.

Wooden Heart not just for Schnitzel lovers any more

The new owners of the Wooden Heart restaurant (Acton Mews, Mill street), bring a wealth of experience to their business.

The mother and son team of Eve and Kenneth Jorgensen, partners in the Wooden Heart, have been in the business for a total of 42 years.

Mrs. Jorgensen has been involved in restaurants for 30 years while Mr. Jorgensen, who is the chef at Wooden Heart, has been a chef for 12 years at two different hotels on the Airport Strip, the stately Banff Springs Hotel on a number of occasions and just recently at Langley Golf Course in Langley, British Columbia.

Both Mrs. Jorgensen and Mr. Jorgensen and his wife are living in Glen Williams.

They have made several changes in the Wooden Heart. It will keep its Bavarian flavor, but since the Jorgensons are from Denmark, the style of cooking will be more Danish.

"We have an international menu," said Mr. Jorgensen "with a good variety of foods, not just schnitzel."

The luncheon menu includes five different schnitzels, a chicken or fish plate, or the dashaway—soup of the day, and an open faced Danish sandwich—the regular beverages and a selection of calorie-loaded desserts.

The dinner menu also includes schnitzels, plus cheese fondue, cabbage rolls, bratwurst, knockwurst, assorted seafood plates, including live lobster when available, French onion soup and steak, truffle, assorted pies, bavarian creme custard, trifle and jello.

The Jorgensons are also planning to alter the interior, change some of the decor, add more seating and install carpeting and room dividers to make it cosier.

They will keep the Wooden Heart open all day Sunday with Sunday brunch a special feature of the restaurant.

They said they are expecting a liquor licence

"any day now" so they will be able to serve imported beers from Germany and Denmark as well as domestic brands and both domestic and imported wine.

They added they have

been quite busy since they took over the restaurant on October 15, especially with the noon-hour and weekend diners.

The Jorgensons will also cater weddings, small parties and luncheons.

"We hope to service the town and the people so they will enjoy themselves," said Mrs. Jorgensen. "I hope they come and try us out."
