

Incumbents survive in some places, lose seats in others

There were some election upsets in Nassagaweya and Erin Township while elsewhere incumbents fared well.

Jo Schneider, who has served several terms as councillor, trounced incumbent Erin Township Deputy Reeve John Reid by 740 ballots to 578.

Erin Township incumbents Duncan Armstrong and George Root fared better than Reid. Root

topped the polls with 823 votes while Armstrong gathered in 891. The third councillor is newcomer Frank Trotter who attracted 720 votes. John Holder, another hopeful, lost. However, Holder did run up a total of 815 votes.

In Erin Village incumbent Laurence G. MacKenzie retained his post with a plurality of 40 votes over challenger Edward Pickersgill. The

numbers were: MacKenzie 260; Pickersgill 220.

Incumbent Rod C. Blair was returned as one of the three trustees of Eden Mills. He tallied 86 votes while John Shaw and Michael Marshall tied at 57. Nick Gould lost with a total of 42 votes.

Nassagaweya has a new regional representative. He is former one-time councillor Brad Clements who ousted incumbent

Gus Goutouski by a margin of 3,273 to 1,919.

Another member of the Goutouski family lost in Monday's election. Gus' daughter Mikki came second last out of a pack of six candidates for local representation.

Former regional councillor Jim Watson, taking his first crack at politics in two years, topped the polls with 503 votes. The incumbent,

Don McMillan, came second and is therefore also elected with 471 ballots.

Roy Galloway was next in Nassagaweya with 428, and Nassagaweya Area Residents' Association chairman Bonnie Elva Newton drew 378. Mikki's tally fits in next and bringing up the rear is Robbie Laird with 160.

Halton Board of Education Trustee Ivan

Armstrong was returned again to office for another two-year term. He handily defeated challenger Dorothy Scruton by more than doubling the vote: 1,325 for Armstrong and 519 for Scruton.

Milton Ward 3 Hydro commissioner Murray Inglis held his seat against challenger Anthony Green. Inglis attracted 671 votes com-

pared to Green's 434.

Eramosa Reeve Bill Adsett was one of those politicians who were acclaimed. Adsett, a veteran of township politics, indicated he will seek the post of Wellington County Warden.

Other members of Eramosa council, who were also acclaimed, are deputy reeve Murray Cox, Gordon Baldwin, Larry McDougall and

George Major.

Rockwood Village Trustee Rick Lewis was returned to office by acclamation. Jan Osborne was acclaimed at the same Jim Funk's name was added, to the list of incumbents at the last minute.

George Day stepped down as Wellington County Board of Education trustee. His place was taken by Betty

Jones, another acclamation.

In Erin Village Deputy Reeve William Weber was returned by acclamation as were councillors Paul Dray and Evelyn O'Sullivan. Terry Mundell is the new councillor in the village.

While Schneider was beating Reid in Erin Township for the deputy-reeve's job, Reeve Bert Wheeler could sit back on

his acclamation.

There was no need of an election in Hillsburgh because trustees John Phillips, Roger Clark and Bert Rodgers were acclaimed.

Don Clement is the first Erin Township Trustee on Wellington's separate board of education. Jean Denison, incumbent trustee for the public school board, was acclaimed.

Veteran Harvey Peart read the names of lost soldiers from the Cenotaph. George Day placed a wreath from the Province of Ontario; Reeve Bill Adsett placed one from the Township of Eramosa; James Milne from the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 197; Lloyd Dyer from Rockwood and District Lions Club; and Lou Hillis in memory of brother John Hillis.

The Canadian flag was lowered by Wally King to the strains of "The Last Post" played on the bagpipes (very moving). Two minutes silence was observed followed by "Reveille" and the flag raising.

Service participants marched down main street to the Presbyterian Church for another service.


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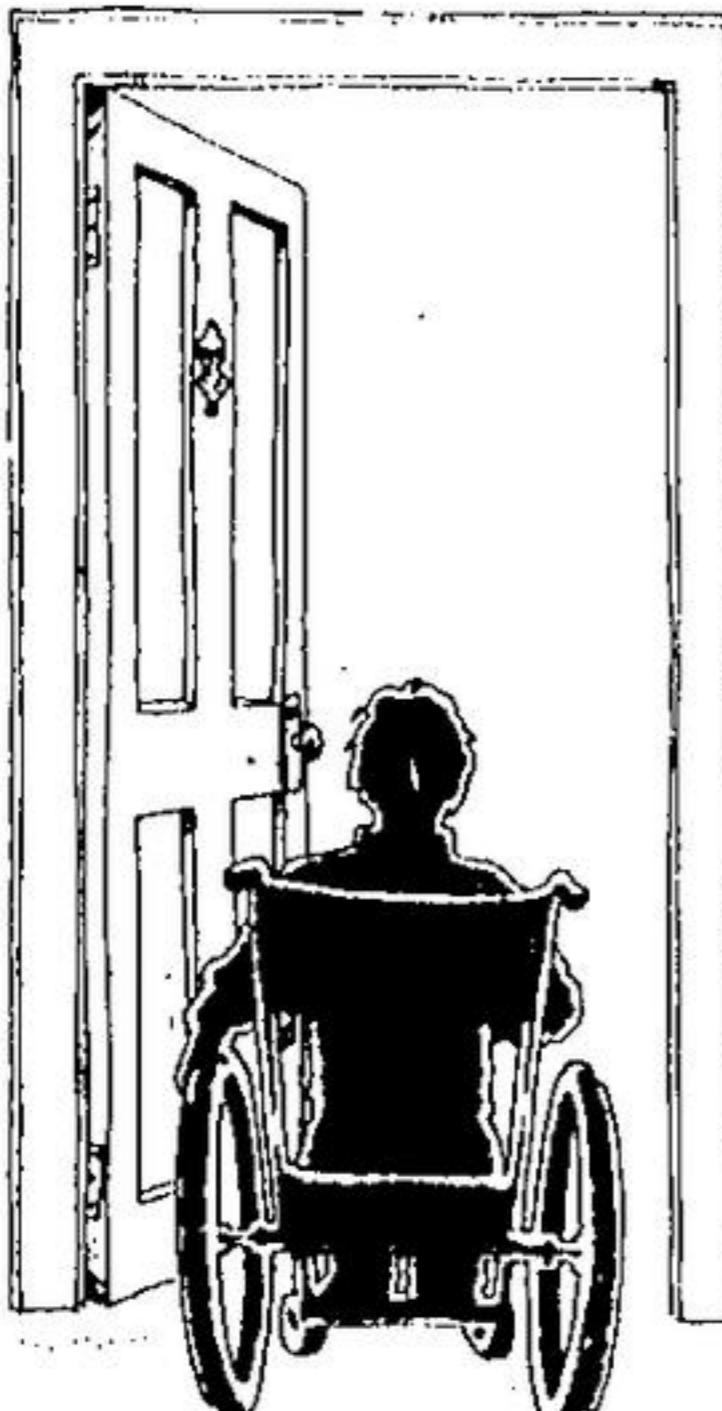
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
