Southgate said police continue monitoring the situation following up leads and "hopefully we'll come up with a suspect." He encourages parents to call him with any information they have about suspicious persons or vehicles around schools and all information will be "checked out." Robert Little principal Ron Chatten said he knows police are investigating and talking with one of his students who says he was followed. He said he and his staff haven't noticed anyone lurking around the school. That student reported being threatened by a man with a knife. Briggs said one of his teachers was at the bus stop Thursday after school and saw a suspicious person hanging around. This person asked some questions about the children, which convinced the teacher there was something wrong. One child, who wasn't sure how to get to his Kingham home was sent home with older children by the teacher and she noticed the man left, following these children. She and Briggs immediately contacted the police. There was another incident at St. Joseph's Friday, but it has proved to be unrelated. A youth, whose description doesn't match the man who was lurking around the school at all, stole a woman's wallet from her purse which was left in her unlocked car along with her 30-month-old child, while she was in one of the schools. That suspect fled. Briggs said he wrote in the letter to parents that the incidents were "reason for concern" listed some safety tips for children and asked parents to discuss with their children the dangers of any approach made to them by a person who is a stranger.

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
