Providing quality health care to Acton residents without increasing costs will continue to be the main goal of the centre. "We have an ongoing challenge to insure that we continue to meet the needs of the people and not become too large to respond efficiently," Marks said.

As a result of complaints from medical doctors, clergy and community representatives, who at the time were experiencing a high degree of frustration not being able to offer adequate services to their clients, the centre was formed in 1977.

Used by provincial, regional and local agencies, as a result of having a co-ordinated interviewing office shared by 10 agencies the overhead is significantly reduced.

"Should the regional politicians decide to cut in the area of health and social care, the providers of these services would be partially to blame for this decision, the reason being, we do not take enough time to outline the cost benefit of providing preventative services," Marks declared.

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
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
