Report recommends housing

A proposed 18-unit senior citizens' home for Rockwood was put on hold until Eramosa Township's new council takes office.

The outgoing municipal government endorsed the need for a senior citizens housing project of 14 or 18 units in the village, as planning consultants Gibson and Bahrynowski recommended.

The report will be presented again to the new council-which has three fresh faces-for a dec-

ision. No commitment was made by the old council. The 67-page report came up with numbers for the proposed housing project which are less then the minimum required by the province. "The ministry of housing usually goes for a minimum of 25 units," said consultant Deirdre Gibson.

There are, according to the consultant, exceptions. Maryborough Township, for example, has a non-profit housing project underway with 15 units.

Two of the alternatives suggested by the consultants were immediately dismissed by council as not being acceptable.

One was to shift the seniors elsewhere, to say Fergus, Guelph or Acton. The other was to join another municipality, such as Erin Township, in a similar project. Erin Township is also looking at a senior citizen's project.

The balance which will be up to the new council to discuss months," said Gibson.

"If we get the OK to start non-profit housing and applications come in for more units than expected, will we have the option to expand," asked Councilfor Dave Masson.

"Not likely," was the reply. However, the government will inspect the waiting list and determine if an expansion is needed or a new building elsewhere in the township.




