The Acton Lions major Pee wees caged Kitchener White 7-2 Thursday in Hub league hockey action. They think the game is under protest with the final result unknown pending notice from the Ontario Minor Hockey Association. One of the Lions was charged with playing with an illegal stick. Coach Barry Insoce said the game was by far the best passing and skating match of the season for the team. Lions showed discipline and team effort, holding control throughout. Steve Wagner who potted five goals in the game opened the scoring for Acton early in the first period on an unassisted marker. He made it 2-0 on his second goal at 7:54, also unassisted, while Gordon Mitchell connected on the third marker a minute later. Wagner potted his third goal for the hat trick midway through the second frame before Kitchener capitalized on the powerplay with two goals of their own. Wagner scored two more at 5:56 and 8:05 of the third both unassisted. Gary MacEachern was the other Acton marksman. The game was called at 5:50 in the third due to curfew.

## Beardmore avenges loss in best effort of season

Acton Beardmore minor peewees, still stinging from a 5-1 loss to Waterloo last month, took their revenge Sunday, dumping the same team 1-0 in Waterloo.

Coach Dan McGilloy said his team played their best game of the season in one of the most exciting matches of the year. The contest featured end to end action, with outstanding goaltending on either end.

Beardmore's only goal wasn't until the 12:22 mark of the third period. Paul Kilpatrick connected on a passing play from Sean Fitzgerald and Gord Taillefer. Before that, the game was scoreless.

McGilloy said the win was the result of a total team effort with forwards, defence and goalies all playing superb hockey. He added he was proud of their performance.

Beardmore had a little more trouble with Hespeler Thursday, battling to a 4-1 tie.

McGilloy said they played well enough to win but breaks were few around the Hespeler net.

He added Beardmore was suffering from shaky defence syndrome while the forwards were not back-checking. The result: Hespeler coming back to tie the game twice.

Kilpatrick opened the scoring, but Hespeler tied it before the end of the first frame. Then they went ahead by one in the second but goals by Taillefer and Chris Roger late in the period put Acton in the lead.

Hespeler scored their tying goals in the third, while Jason O'Neill was the other Acton marksman.

Acton assists went to Peter Cargill and Kirk Taillefer, Dean Cote, McNabb.

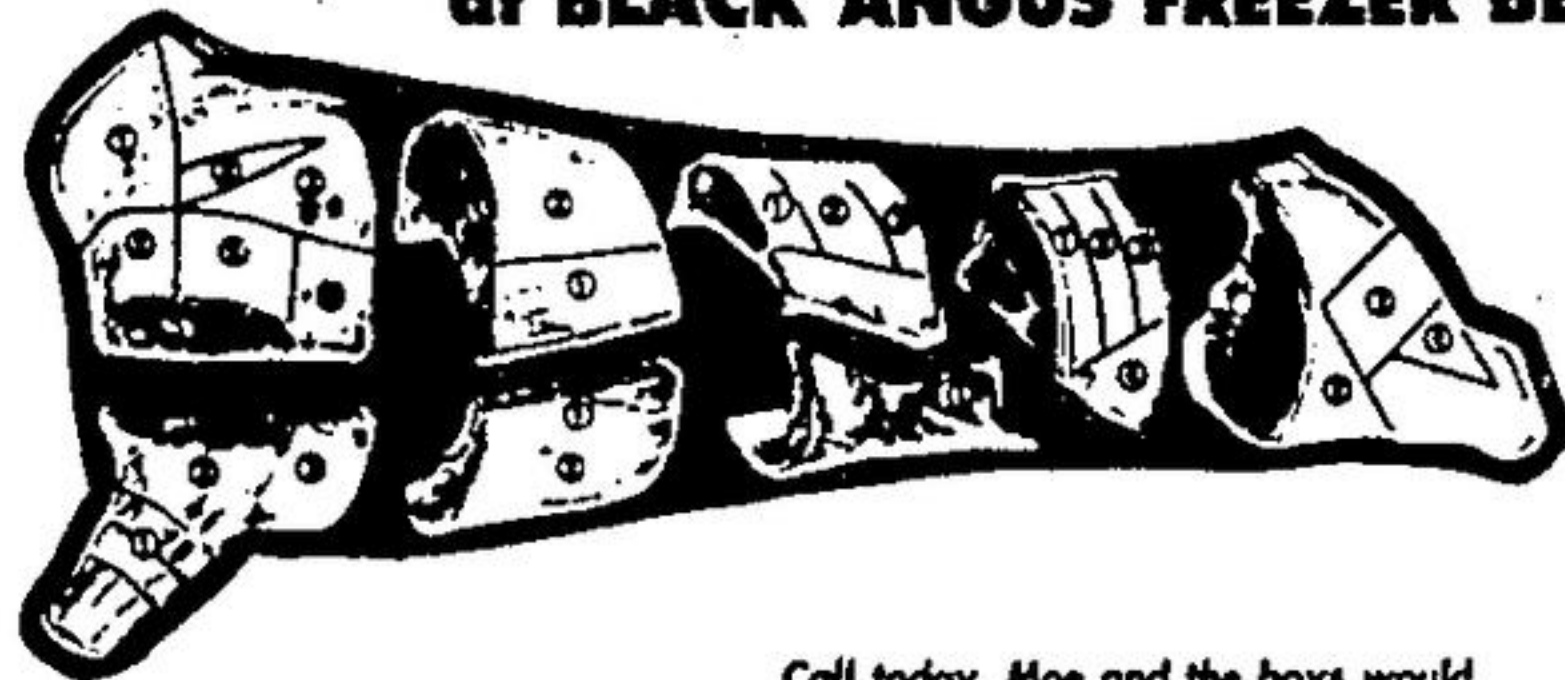

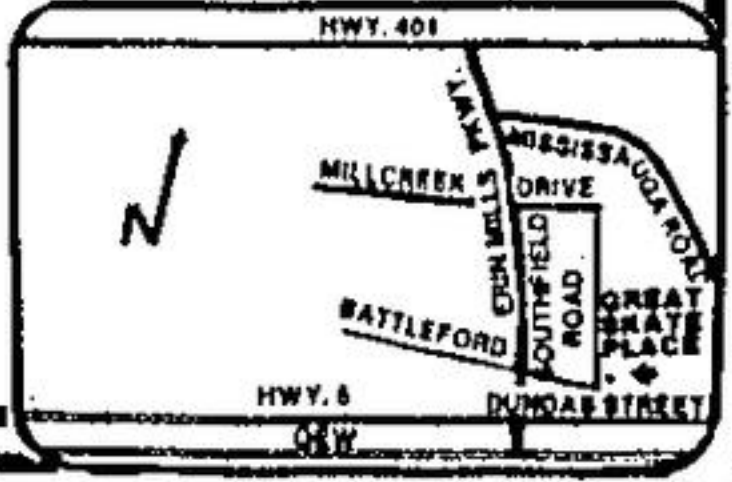
