Issue safety tips for fireplaces, woodstoves

Every winter, the fire departments in Halton answer several fire calls in homes that were caused by wood burning stoves and free-standing fireplaces. These items are enjoying immense popularity right now, among energy-conscious homeowners.

So Halton Fire Prevention Committee has issued a few pointers on their safe use.

"Be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions, says Capt. Art McCreary of Burlington, 1980 Chairman of the Regional Fire Prevention Committee. "Most of these fire calls could have been avoided, if people would only follow the directions," he said.

Free-standing fireplaces and wood stoves must be set up to a certain distance from combustible materials, and this is clearly stated in the installation instructions.

Some fires have resulted from homeowners using the wrong type of chimney in the wrong spot. And some calls resulted from chimneys which have not been cleaned.

"Clean your chimney at least once a season—more often if green or wet wood is used," he said.

For wood or oil fires, a "Class A" chimney is required. This is a masonry chimney or masonry lined steel, built to Underwriters Laboratory of Canada (ULC) standards. The "B" type is used only for gas fires.

The Committee suggests homeowners who need advice on the installation of wood burning stoves should contact the local fire department, or building department.

The current Chamber of Commerce saw its beginnings in the Businessmen's Association, of which Marks was an original member in 1947.

In 1953, Marks' son Martin, age 16, became the youngest pilot in Canada when he made his solo flight. When he turned 18 he received his private pilot's license, and his first two passengers, were his parents.

All of Ernie Marks' five children, he states proudly, still reside in Halton. Two are still in Acton, Lonnie and Peter, who also serve on Acton and Halton Hills council.

"Having a good mother," is what Marks credits to his children's successful and happy adult years.

"Sure I came up the hard way," he said "but it never hurt us a bit. I have never lived in the city since I was married. Acton has been good to me and I have been lucky. It was and still is a friendly town. We have been happy here."
