But he hasn't forsook the Sabres, who

since moved into Junior B status. Although he must cover the rival Burlington Cougars, Gibbons still holds a soft spot in his heart for our own Swordsmen.

So much in fact, he wrote a column about them the other day. He wrote about the folks in Tannerytown (that's us), having made suggestions "that the goose-pimpled skin of one Denis Gibbons be the first tacked to the wall of the Old Hide House." "Under it (he wrote), would appear a

simple inscription. "But the only thing sure, besides death and taxes, he regrets to say, is that the Acton Sabres will be last again."

His prediction of the Sabres along with the rest of the Junior B league, appeared in the Sept. 27 issue of the Post.

HolHo!Ho! Jules Russlani and the Sabres sure showed him. The season is at the midway point and Acton isn't anywhere near last place. Ha! Ha! Ha! They do indeed, as Gibbons puts it, have a com-

fortable hold on fourth place. Not only that, (teehee) the Sabres have already beaten the Cougars Into submission once this season 8-6 in November.

The fact they lost Friday night (after suffering an incurable bout of home ice sickness) 7-6 in Burlington is of little consequence. You can still catch an Acton Sabre fan gloating and with just cause.
