

# Council supports Tyler's bid to extend its bus service

Tyler Transport Ltd. will have the support of Halton Hills council in its bid to extend the bus service to the airport, to MacDonnell-Douglas aircraft plant, and charter rights outside the province.

Appearing before Halton Hills council Monday night, Ted Tyler asked that the mayor or a designate appear at a public hearing January 13 merely to state it would benefit the Town.

He also wants his bus licences to state clearly that all of Halton Hills is included, since the firm has long been established in Acton.

While Tyler Transport has been running buses to various bingos in Guelph, Kitchener, the International Centre Tyler

wants his licence to verify he has that right.

Tyler said he received 40 replies to an advertisement when he asked if there was interest in a workers bus to MacDonnell-Douglas on a regular schedule basis. He said the GO Transit bus is excellent but does not fit all shift schedules.

He said the bid for a licence to travel to Toronto International Airport is backed by the owners of Mohawk Inn and Georgetown Motor Inn, as well as various industries in the area. He pointed out Guelph and Kitchener obtained such a licence when they were smaller than the combined Milton, Acton and Georgetown area.

Tyler explained he has the right to run buses on a charter basis to the airport, but wants to operate on a regular passenger fare basis rather than having one person pay for the whole bus. "This way it's up to me if I fill the bus."

While at the airport he wants the right to pick up air express parcels and bring them back.

He said at present he cannot go outside the

province and when his travel tours are chartered he must use other buses. In addition with an out-of-province licence travellers could start right from Halton Hills instead of going from Galt or Toronto or some other place to catch the bus.

He described Georgetown, Acton and Milton as "sleeping giants" with lots of offer such as skiing, selling and the Bruce Trail, if properly promoted.

Ultimately Tyler would like to include this area in travel brochures at stop-over points on the way to other places. Asked if he anticipated any opposition at the hearing, Tyler said he knew there would be, but said that is normal.

## Council appointments

At their first meeting of the year, Halton Hills council authorized appointments to various boards.

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## Former Actonian Bean back

Frank Bean has been returned a chairman of Peel Region for another two years when council voted unanimously for his acclamation.

Bean became chairman in May of 1979 when Lou Parsons resigned the position to work for a development firm. He was a surprise choice but a popular one as this year's acclamation shows.

Bean has roots in Halton Hills, spending his youth in Acton where his father ran an insurance business. A politician for 15 years and a must enthusiast he expected a challenge for the \$45,000 a year position as head of a 21 member regional council.

Reflecting on his acclamation, Bean said "I guess what I like about the acclamation is the confidence and support shown me from all over the region—not just Mississauga, but Brampton and Caledon, too."

However, Caledon mayor John Clarkson who earlier said he would run against Bean if he could get the backing, has told reporters he is still unhappy with Bean. He failed to show up for the inaugural which drew such personages as Premier William Davis and MP John McDermid as well as other Peel notables. He was the sole dissenter.

Bean was nominated by Brampton mayor Jim Archdekin and Mississauga mayor Hazel McCallion seconded the nomination.
