Town has music in it once more

Actonians have a song in their heart and a dance in their step once more thanks to the opening of a new music store on Mill Street.

E and M Music, an all-purpose music store opened December 10. It's a business venture run by a wife and husband team, Edna and Mitch Kennedy, both of Acton.

Mrs. Kennedy said they opened the shop because her husband decided Acton needed one, especially since Watson's Music closed. Running a music store is a new adventure for the both of them, although Mrs. Kennedy has worked in a store for seven years and helped her father with his business.

E and M Music stocks the top 30 pop rock, country and western and easy listening albums as well as top 30 singles and cassettes and 8-tracks.

But, added Mrs. Kennedy, as well as records, E and M will eventually stock musical instruments and offer lessons.

As is, whatever is not in stock will be ordered. She said they can order just about anything that's been pressed.

"A lot of kids can't get out of town to buy records," said Mrs. Kennedy. "And they like to have them. I know, I have kids of my own."

Her children, Tina, 22, and teenagers Rod and Scott help out in the store as well as sister-in-law Gloria Jennings.

Mrs. Kennedy handles the store during her lunch breaks and after work at A-B Foodland.

Everyone in the family likes music, she said, although "I can't play a thing".

Music talent or not, business has been good so far, reports Mrs. Kennedy.

"A lot of people come to say they're glad we're here. It's something Acton has needed. We had a very good response."

NDP not in hip pocket of Unions — Chambers

Mario Chambers, NDP candidate for Wellington-Dufferin-Peel, "an NDP Government in Ontario would not kowtow to all the demands of Labor."

Speaking in the Steelworkers Hall in Ferris, where she asked for the Union's support in the next election, Mrs. Chambers said, "the Tories often slavishly follow the wishes of big business. We would not be a mirror image of a Tory Government."

Mrs. Chambers referred to events in British Columbia and Saskatchewan where NDP Governments took stands that angered certain Unions. She did promise however, that the NDP "would never remove your rights to organize, to speak for workers, and to enter into Collective Bargaining."

Mrs. Chambers criticized the Davis Government in the face of rising unemployment and plant closures.

"Since January, 46,000 workers have been laid off in Ontario, an increase of 1100 per cent in one year," she said.

Unemployment in Ontario "is at its highest level since the 30s" Mrs. Chambers told the steel workers.

Mrs. Chambers said Ontario has lost "96,000 acres of farmland since 1954 for every Tory sitting in Queen's Park."

She blamed the loss of jobs in the agricultural sector on "foreign ownership" in the food processing sector of the economy.

"Before they were bought out by Del Monte," Mrs. Chambers said, "Canadian canners operated 37 plants in Ontario. Now they operate seven."

Snowmobile fatality

A former Acton resident who worked in construction in the area for a few years, Bobby Collins died recently following a snowmobile accident at Belwood Conservation Area.

Mr. Collins died of injuries sustained in the accident on December 20. Son of Bert and Thelma Collins of Mississauga, funeral service was held for the deceased last Tuesday at Skinner and Middlebrook funeral home in Port Credit. Interment followed at St. John's Cemetery, Dixie.

No impaired drivers

During Christmas week, December 18 to 25, Halton Regional Police stopped 321 vehicles in the region during their holiday roadside check program. Not one impaired driver was found.

Police say 212 warnings under the highway Traffic Act for safety features on the vehicle were issued. Charges under the same act totalled 26. Three persons were charged in connection with liquor offences in the vehicle while 2 were caught driving while under suspension and one driver had no insurance.

The study, which will define areas in the delivery of Health care which need to be upgraded, is to be submitted to the Ontario Health Minister on completion.
