

# New research due to Terry's run

"Marathon of Hope", undertaken in Canada and which could stimulate further progress in this field," explained Dr. Ruth Allison, president of the Canadian Cancer Society. "We spent a great deal of time consulting with leading Canadian research scientists to develop avenues that could best aid investigators in Canadian cancer research. We then met with Terry and his mother to obtain concept approvals."

To date, three programs have been developed by the

National Cancer Institute of Canada under the auspices of the Canadian Cancer Society as a result of Terry Fox's efforts: the Terry Fox Special Initiatives Program, the Terry Fox Special Cancer Research Fund, and the Terry Fox Training Centre Establishment Grants.

The Terry Fox Special Initiative Program is designed to develop new dimensions and encourage innovation in cancer research in Canada. It will identify exceptional cancer research investigators and provide them with additional and special measures of support to enable them to

undertake a wider range of research activities. The Terry Fox Special Cancer Research Fund will facilitate the immediate expansion and strengthening of the cancer research base across Canada. Medical schools and similar facilities will be asked to identify critical factors and problems that limit their ability to develop innovative cancer research programs. Funds will be made available to help expedite these programs.

High quality, unprecedented cancer research in Canada depends on attracting astute, young people into the field. The Terry Fox Training Centre Establishment Grants will provide special support to selected centres allowing them to attract promising, outstanding investigators into cancer research.

"Cancer research not only requires dedication but bright minds and the proper facilities for any advancement, no matter how minuscule," commented Dr. Ray Bush, president of the National Cancer Institute of Canada. "That one minuscule discovery could be the key needed to beat cancer. We hope these programs will spur such a discovery."

The NCIC board of directors has established a committee of local and international cancer researchers to finalize and monitor these programs. Dr. Louis Siminovitch, geneticist-in-chief at The Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto, has been appointed chairman of the NCIC's "Marathon of Hope" research programs.

Details of funding, eligibility requirements and the administering of the "Marathon of Hope" research programs will be finalized and announced in December.

## Obituary Alex Brunton

Horse owner and trainer, Alexander McLachlan Brunton died suddenly December 3 at Mohawk Raceway in his 58th year.

A resident of RR 1 Acton for the past two years, Mr. Brunton is survived by his wife, the former Dorrie Pennington, children Mary Lincoln of Brampton, Alexander McLachlan Brunton of Etobicoke and Laurie Elizabeth Brunton of Acton, and grandchild Vanessa Lincoln. Also left to mourn are brothers Robert and sisters Georgina Russell, Betty McAfferty and Jessie McLaughlin all of Scotland.

Born the son of the late Robert and Alice Brunton in Glasgow Scotland, January 6, 1925, Mr. Brunton married his wife, who was from England, February 2, 1948 in Glasgow. The couple came to Canada soon after and took up residence in Malton, Ontario.

Mr. Brunton worked for the Canadian Pacific Railway in West Toronto when he first arrived here then joined the Ministry of Transport at Toronto International Airport where he has worked for the past 28 years.

He had a great love of horses, owning and training his own racing stock with the help of his wife and daughter Laurie. He was a member of the Canadian Standardbred Horse Society and the Canadian Trotting Association.

He spent four years in the Royal Engineers during World War II and saw duty in France just after D-Day, where he was wounded and sent back to Britain.

Mr. Brunton is described as a great family man.

He was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, Acton.

Funeral service was held December 6 at Shoemaker Funeral Home with Rev. John Robertson officiating.

Interment took place at Fairview Cemetery.

## Obituary Marion Reed

Former Acton High School teacher and mother of Liberal Halton-Burlington MPP Julian Reed, Marion Reed died recently at Peel Memorial Hospital after a lengthy illness.

A descendant of Robert Noble, who bought the grist, saw and woolen mills in Norval in 1868, Mrs. Reed was born in Norval in 1907. Her father, the late Lt. Col. Alex Noble led the Halton Rifles in World War I.

During her career as teacher of languages, she taught at Humboldt Collegiate Institute, East York Collegiate and Acton High School.

A woman of many accomplishments, she was one of the original directors of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, was an early member of Georgetown Hospital Board, the Norval Women's Institute and Norval United Church.

Mrs. Reed graduated from Brampton High School and earned a modern languages degree from the University of Toronto in 1929, then did graduate work at the Sorbonne in Paris.

During her career as teacher of languages, she taught at Humboldt Collegiate Institute, East York Collegiate and Acton High School.
