## Country shop feeling at upholster's log home

You can't miss Dave Tarzwell's Country Custom Upholstery on Fourth Line. It's the only upholstery business in a log house.  
Actually the log house is the Tarzwell home while Tarzwell's shop is right beside it in the converted garage. Come summer, Tarzwell said, he will expand the shop and turn it into a log cabin to match the house he built.  
Country Custom Upholstery is new to the Acton area. Tarzwell moved to the Fourth Line in November after spending 22 years in Georgetown, learning his trade.  
He built the two storey home himself last summer, learning how to do it, he said, as each log went up. He said it wasn't as difficult as he thought, in fact "it worked out well". A lot easier than custom upholstery.  
"That's something you can't learn from a book. You have to train for it." For example, he said, right now he is changing a sofa into a love seat.  
Tarzwell said he offers a complete custom service as well as supply fabrics, materials and free hints for do it yourselfers.  
It's a business, he said, Acton has needed and he's been keeping busy. He said he's booked up a month in advance but can always fit in a customer who needs something done in a hurry.  
He works at his job full-time, sometimes with the help of his wife. They have two children, aged five and two and one friendly puppy.  
Tarzwell said although he was raised in Halton Hills, he never realized how beautiful Acton was until he moved here. "We really like it here," he said.  
He said he wants a small country shop atmosphere—hence the name and log houses. He added he gives free estimates day or evening. Just call or drop by the shop on the Fourth Line, south of Highway 7.

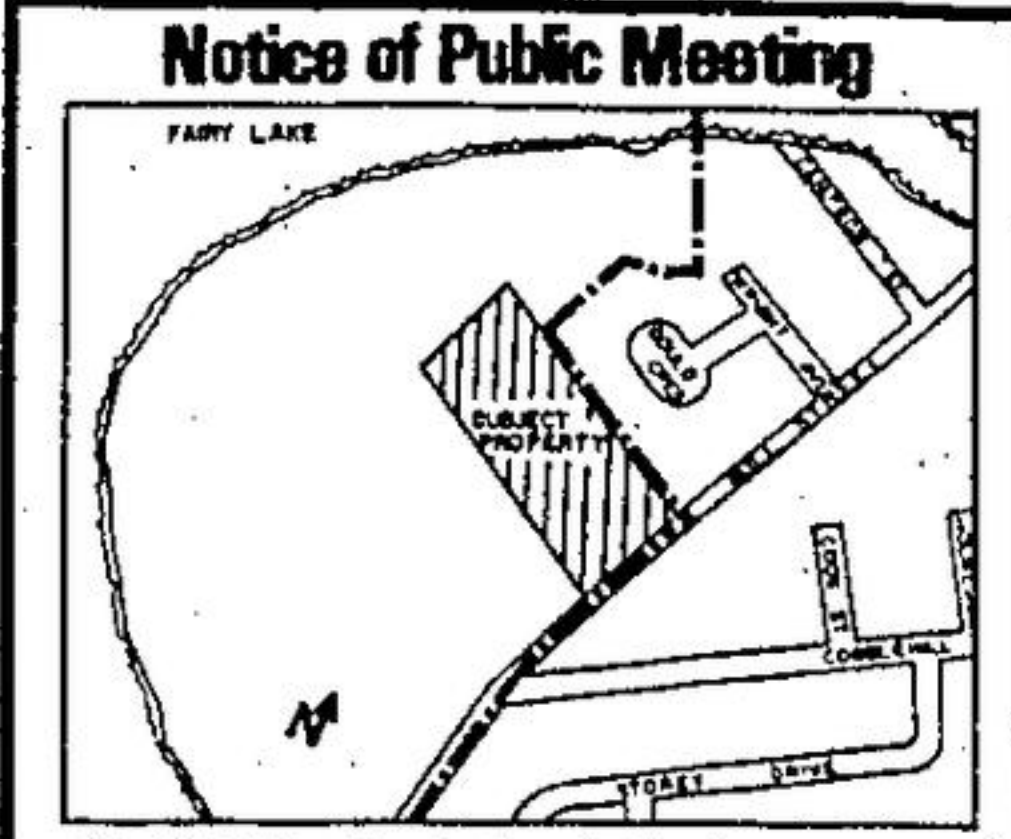
## Extra police pay means deficit

Halton Region is facing a problem of how to account for about \$290,000 in police salaries which were paid out last year but not included in the force's annual budget.  
In most years, there are 26 pay days for Halton's 275 police officers but in 1980 an extra pay day fell on Dec. 31.  
It will cost the region an additional \$290,000 but regional officials have yet to decide whether the money will be listed as a 1980 expenditure or put onto this year's police budget.  
If the money is listed as an extra cost for 1980, it will serve to swell a deficit situation which is already plaguing the region.  
Halton's auditors—the firms of Cheney, Glenn and Graydon and Goebell, Wagner and MacAdam—have recommended against putting the \$290,000 as a 1981 expenditure since it actually occurred last year, acting regional deputy treasurer Donald Farmer told The Free Press.

"It's not in the 1980 budget but the auditors feel the amount should be charged against the 1980 year," he said.  
The extra pay day "catches up with you every 11 years," Mr. Farmer said, because of calendar variations.  
The Halton Police Commission warned the region last month about the problem and officials decided to move the Dec. 31 pay date ahead one day to Jan. 1, so the salary money could be classified as a 1981 expense.  
However, due to a mistake, the 275 salary cheques were made out for Dec. 31 instead.

## 316 stray dogs killed

A total of 316 stray dogs were destroyed during 1980, a drop of 11 from the previous year, a report from Animal Control Officer, Joe Kirley informed council Monday night.  
In the past year the number of calls dropped from 3257 in 1979 to 2996 this year. A total of 539 dogs were impounded, a drop from 501 in 1979.

## Region attends Land Division Comm. meetings

Halton Region's Planning Department will have a representative at Land Division Committee meetings for the next three months, on a trial basis.  
The experiment will last for three months so that it can be concluded by the time the 1981 operating budget is discussed. If it proves that a person is needed indefinitely, it could be made part of the Planning Department budget requests.  
The planning committee has had several discussions on land severances given by the Land Division Committee, which Planning staff have opposed for one reason or another.  
It had been suggested the objections of the region should be made at the Land Division Committee. Letters from the planning department are normally sent but they don't necessarily have to be included in the discussion of land severances.  
Planning Committee wants a staff representative on the scene to find out if the letters have any bearing and if the representative can make comment at the time of the severance discussion.
