Section 86 debate important

Halton Hills council's upcoming debate on property tax assessment reform could be the most important discussion of this two year term Mayor Peter Pomeroy has predicted.

Council was slated to debate Section 86, equalized assessment, on March 9, but at the urging of Pomeroy the discussion was moved to the March 2 council meeting Monday night so all members would be in attendance.

After rejecting Section 86 last year councillors set up a special council-citizen committee to study the entire issue.

Committee chairman Ross Knechtel tabled the report last month and it has twice been deferred for further study.

The report shows assessment would increase on 3,950 properties, decrease for 3,310 and 2,897 wouldn't change.

Board dollar boss shy of certificate

The second highest administrative job in Halton's Board of Education has gone to a woman who does not hold all the advertised requirements—yet.

Barbara Moore, 30, was appointed Superintendent of Business and Finance during the board's Thursday meeting at Burlington.

The appointment is subject to Mrs. Moore's

successful completion of requirements for the Supervisor Officer's Certificate. She has been given more than 13 months to complete the requirements.

Advertisements for the \$52,123 a year job state "Candidates should have: A supervisory officer's certificate. There were other qualifications.

Seven qualified candidates applied for the position, according to a board memo.

The superintendent of business and finance prepares and administers the current and capital budgets. Lesser administrators report to the superintendent.

A committee of trustees and senior staff interviewed four candidates.

Mrs. Moore has steadily risen in the ranks at the Halton board until becoming assistant to Bruce Lindley. He is retiring this year as superintendent of business and finance.

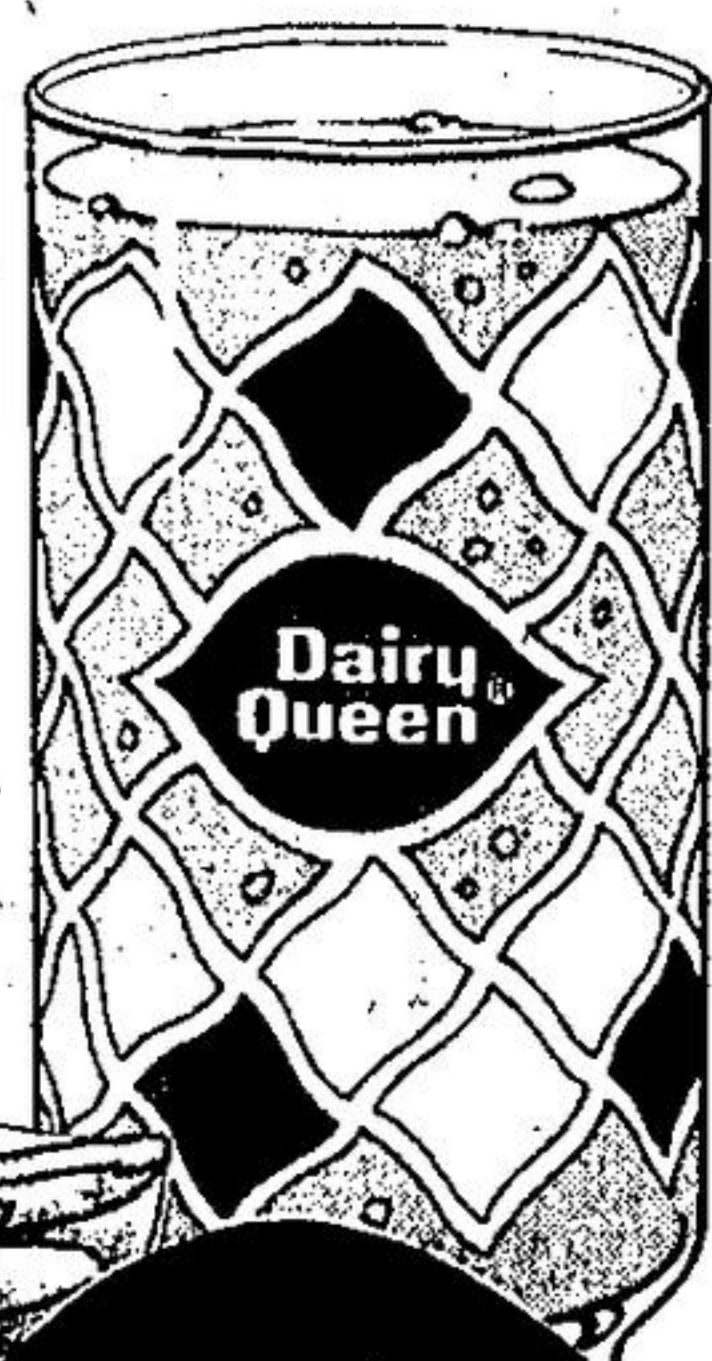
