Series on the line in weekend games

Two days from now the Acton Sabres will be skating onto the ice at the Central Recreation Centre in Burlington to play the most important game of their existance

Friday the Sabres meet Burlington Cougars in the fifth game of best-of-seven central junior B quarter-finals, both teams even at two games apiece.

The Sabres surprised everyone, perhaps even themselves by winning the second and third games of the series. They could have wrapped it up by Friday, had the Cougars not come back Monday to tie the quarter-

But let's start at the beginning of the saga. The playoffs started last Wednesday night at the Community Centre with Acton taking a 8-3 beating. It was a terrible game by both teams.

Burlington had jumped into a two-goal lead by the end of the first period, but the Sabres came back to tie it early in the second. Glenn Murray potted the first one on a powerplay at 7.17. Barry Trood and Dave McGilloway assisted.

Twenty seconds later Tony Dullsse tied it up assisted by Trood. The Cougars went ahead two minutes later on a powerplay goal and then increased their lead a minute after that.

Dennis Charbonneau put the Sabres back in the game at 11.35, but with only 48 seconds left the Cougars scored again. And again with two seconds left, making it 5-3 at the end of the second.

Sabres were jittery all night but by the third period they had dissolved into confusion. The Cougars outmuscled them and putplayed them, scoring shorthandedly several times.

They also got a little chippy, prolonging the final four minutes of the game with several fights. Only one major penalty was given out, to Gary Williams of the Sabres and to the Cougars, as well as a couple of minors.

McDougall was the lone Sabre who played well, or as well as he could under the circumstances, as Cougars outshot Sabres

End result: Cougars up by one. Friday night in Burlington, Sabres turned the tables. They not only handed the Cougars a 9-5 loss on home ice, but did it convincingly, thanks to a third-period ex-

Sabres were down 4-2 by the end of the first, with Murray and Mike Monahan scoring at 5.47 and 6.04. Murray's goal was on the powerplay, assisted by Denis Kirton and Mark Duval. Rob Vermuelen and Dul-

isse aided Monahan. But Cougars came back scoring at 13.40, 16.18, 17 minutes on the powerplay and

Sabres did a complete turnaround after coach Jules Russiani got them cranked up in the dressing room between periods. "The boys just decided they could beat them," stated Russiani. So they did.

Murray connected on two goals in the second, giving him the hat trick. He scored on the powerplay at 5.44 and again at 8.12. Then in the third, Steve Miller popped in a shorthanded goal unassisted, to take the

Murray counted his fourth goal, once more on the powerplay at 2.51; Dave McGilloway, Trood and Duval rounded out the scoring. McGilloway, Monahan, Trood, Charbonneau and Roy Dollman assisted. Cougars scored the final goal with eight

seconds left in the game. The tally - all even at one game aplece. Back in Acton Saturday night, with a crowd of 800 behind their team all the way, the Sabres skated away with their second victory - this time on a 6-5 score.

It was an unusual game that saw both teams awarded a penalty shot. Cougars were the first to score, on the penalty shot at 17.48 of the first.

They took a 2-0 lead early in the second on a shorthanded goal by Marty Prowse, but Sabres fought back. Pat Fung brought the crowd to its feet with his goal at 7.12 with Dollman aiding.

Then Monahan was awarded a penalty shot after being pulled down from behind with less than two minutes left in the second period. He scored, tucking the puck in the left corner after faking the goaltender Blair. Once more the crowd was on their

feet and the Sabres never looked back. With a second left in the period Duval picked up a rebound to make it 3-2. The Cougars tied it briefly in the third, but Miller connected on a wrist shot at 4.39, via Dollman and Fung.

Less than a minute later Murray showed why he was voted MVP of the league coming through with the Sabres fifth goal, assisted by linemate Trood. Trood scored

the eventual winner, aided and abetted by

Murray only eight seconds after that. The possibility of overtime rose after the Cougars scored on two powerplay efforts, the last one with only 23 seconds left in the third, and an extra attacker. But the Sabres hung on, taking a one game lead in the ser-

Russiani sald prior to Monday's game he had hoped to wrap the series up by Friday, although the Cougars would have the home. ice advantage. Russiani said the Sabres play better on larger ice surface; their game plan works better.

Besides he added, the Cougars get neryous playing in Acton and the smaller ice hinders their skating style.

But first-place Cougars came through in the crunch Monday. Russiani said afterwards he couldn't fault his team.

"We were just tired. The boys tried to get themselves up but they were emotionally and physically drained," he said.

"It took a lot out of them to win the two games. We can't expect too much." Russiani said he was more surprised with the results of the first game than with winning two straight. "I knew we would be neryous but I didn't think we'd be that bad. We weren't playing hockey at all."

"But we'll be okay by Friday," he assured. "They just need some sleep and rest." The Sabres practised in Georgetown last night (Tuesday); they can't secure ice time in Acton this week, something about which Russiani isn't pleased.

"Here's a team in contention for the OHA championship and we can't even get ice time," he fumed.

Then he added, "We have a lot more confidence in ourselves than the fans."

Still the fans accompanied them to Monday's match. The game was tied 1-1 after the first period, but the Cougars jumped into a 3-1 lead by the second. Trood was the Acton marksman with Dulisse earning the

Russiani stressed the importance of Friday's game, although they play again Saturday. A loss Friday would put pressure on the youthful and inexperienced Sabres. Chances are whichever team wins will take the series. And it's anybody's game.
