Ministry needs property for Hwy. 25

Construction could start as early as next fall on the first phase of improvements to Highway 25, between Highway 401 and Speyside, senior project manager Allan Sulavella said at an information centre held Thursday at Speyside Public School.

It was the second information centre held by the Ministry of Transportation and Communication, which plans to widen a portion of the highway, pave the shoulders and add turning lanes between Highway 401 and Acton.

The first session, held in September, was a preliminary hearing to get the public's viewpoint, said Sulavella. He said since then the ministry has considered the comment sheets, handed in by public and replied personally to those who had questions or requests.

Sulavella said the ministry is at the stage where they will be making property requests. He said they would be dealing with about 20 land owners, requiring land varying from 5 to 20 feet in width.

He stated they will issue those requests next month, but it would take about half-a-year to buy the property. After that construction could begin.

In the meantime, he added, the ministry is also preparing detailed plans for contracts.

The entire five year project is going to cost \$2.2 million but the Ministry will be saving money, said Sulavella by recycling the old asphalt.

The ministry plans to plane off three-and-a-half inches of pavement to flatten the road and improve drainage. The asphalt will be stockpiled and later mixed with the new asphalt, on a half-and-half basis, that will resurface the highway.

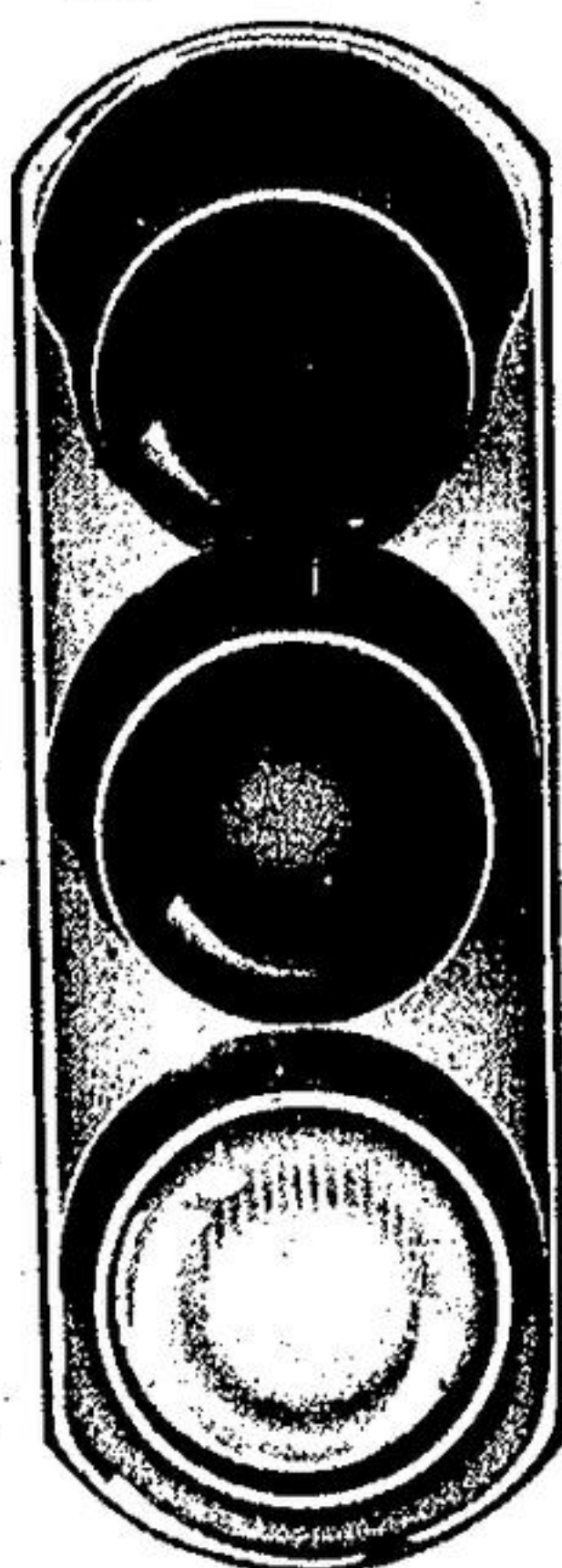
Give the green light to a bright idea.
