Council amending bylaw stray dogs may be shot

Some firepower is being written into Eramosa's dog control bylaw as a direct result of an Everton citizen's charge that council has been negligent.

Eramosa Reeve Bill Adsett directed that a new section be added to the bylaw which would allow a responsible officer to shoot stray dogs. Clerk Lloyd Hindley indicated the addition could be ready for council by March 16.

Rockwood especially, and to a lesser extent Eden Mills have seen a number of stray dogs roaming about.

Some village children had to be vaccinated against an outbreak of rabies last year as a result of bites by stray dogs on the grounds of Centennial School.

If the present dog control officer finds the shooting of dogs unpalatable, then there is someone who will do it. Adsett told council Monday.

The reeve also suggested council "enforce the bylaw to the letter." that could mean a number of
