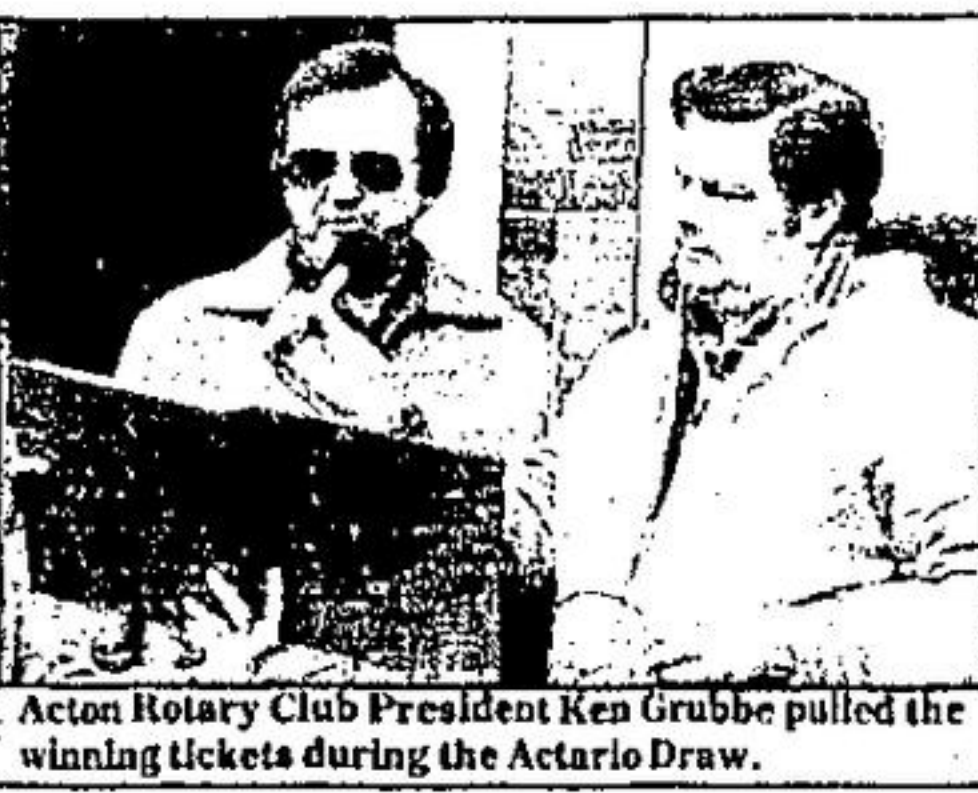

Petitioner feels Baines ruling just

Oriena Currie, the feisty 46-year-old Campbellville businesswoman who decided to take PC candidate Fran Baines to Ontario supreme court, is not showing any bitterness at losing her case.
Late last Wednesday afternoon Judge R.E. Holland announced his decision not to grant an injunction that would have resulted in Mrs. Baines's candidacy overturned and a second nomination meeting called.
The ruling was made despite a last-minute affidavit from Mrs. Baines's opponent Brian Penman stating he would run as a PC candidate if an injunction was granted.
"I don't regret it," she said of her court action. "At least I can look back and say I did something."
Mrs. Currie took the matter to court after she was denied a vote at the Feb. 9 PC nomination meeting.
Mrs. Currie described the verdict as a "common sense" decision, adding the judge was concerned with the fact there was little time left to call another nomination and that \$18,000 had already been spent on the

Baines campaign.
Mrs. Currie, who joined the local Liberal association four days after the PC nomination meeting to register her protest, said she doesn't know who she will vote for, "but it won't be the PC party."
