Council backs livestock rule

If someone makes a big enough stink about infractions of Eramosa building Township's bylaws, then council will do something. Especially when livestock is involved.

That's the message from township council's handling of the Dirk Jansen's case. Jansen has a 20 by 36 foot shed on less than ten acres of Everton property. In that shed he has kept some livestock: a helfer, a couple of calves, a couple of pigs for his son and

some show birds. The township has a bylaw which forbids livestock on property of less than ten acres. Jansen told Eramosa

Township councillors Monday that he feels he is being victimized because the building inspector threatened to revoke his building permit if the animals are not removed.

Council decided to support building inspector John Salmon and force Jansen to comply with the bylaw. Council,
