Laing on road to championship

Laing Construction major atoms have reached the finals of the OMHA playoffs af-

ter defeating Beamsville in four games. Laing nipped Beamsville 4-3 in the fourth match of the best-of-five series Saturday at the Community Centre, to win the series and advance to the OMHA finals, the first local team to accomplish that feat this sea-

Acton played an outstanding game Saturday, outhustling and outmuscling Beamsville for the win.

The score was tled one goal aplece after the first period. John Van Dam scored for Laing just 53 seconds into the frame, from Greg Leatherland and Lee Yaroschak. But Beamsville came back to tle it up
