Renovations are taking place to the floors of the lounge and television room. This caused some disturbance during the week and members had to crowd into the games room.

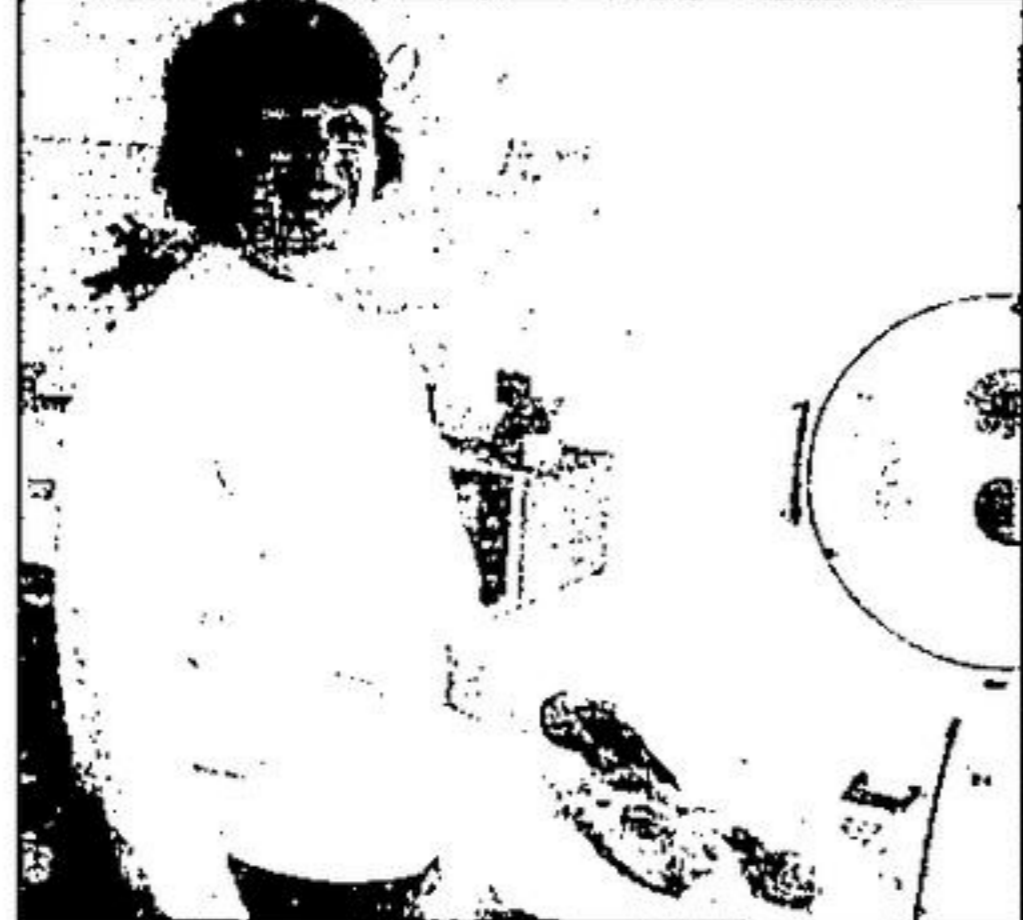

### Store leaves high prices in the cold

Karen Shortill, manager of Freezer Frenzy has put the high price of meat into a deep freeze.

Freezer Frenzy, a new meat market specializing in selling bulk, held their grand opening at the 12 Mill Street W. location in February and since then, says Miss Shortill, business has been picking up.

It's a relatively new venture for Miss Shortill. She operated a business from one freezer in a garage on Highway 25 for two years as a sideline. But she added, her goal is to be as big as the Corner Store in Guelph, another meat market.

She said she likes working the store although she's been learning about the meat business "the hard way". She said it takes time to learn about products.

"I didn't know much about meat when I started, especially the difference between frozen and fresh. But I do now," she assures us.

Miss Shortill is originally from Ballinafad, but lives in Acton. The Freezer Frenzy sells meat, fish, lobster, vegetables and pop, by the bulk and by the pound.
