Even though she's been at it only four months, sewing leather presents no problem for Jan Dilbey. She has been doing alterations and upholstery sewing for the olde Hide House in Acton since it opened in November.

"I've sewed all my life," Jan explains, adding she's worked in fur and has considerable experience with conventional upholstery.

But it's not just in the realm of leather work this interesting lady is making her mark. She's an artist, she's a poet, she designs costumes for equestrians, she's a wife, mother and country

homemaker. "I'm just bursting with ideas," she bubbles. She describes herself as schizophrenic and she certainly has to be to keep her many activities

"You should see our house" she laughs commenting she has piles of sewing, leather and painting materials all over the living areas.

Married to Ron Dilbey, mother of teenage daughters Denise and Diane, Jan and family live on the Blue Springs Line. Ten acres and an unfin-ished family-built house used to keep Jan busy as she tried her hand at farming and rabbit raising. Needing to branch out she turned her talents to real estate and insurance sales. But "I'm creative," Jan explains.

Portralture in pastels and pencil filled her creative outlet for some time as Jan found herself a job sketching portraits at Bramalea City Centre. She also started to write poetry. "I'm a late bloomer" she chuckles reciting a

charming poem she says is one of many she has stored at home. Years of 'do-it-yourself' work have taught Jan

the basics of sewing, tailoring, and custom upholstery. When the newly opened olde Hide House

advertised for someone to take care of leather clothing alterations last fall, Jan says she felt the work would be challenging.

One thing led to another. She purchased a spec-

tal heavy duty sewing machine and went to work. She's now upholstering with leather or hides, doing repairs for horse harness and tack and creating leather equestrian show costumes.

"I can do anything anyone requests," she com-

Leather upholstery is specialized and con-siderably more complicated that cloth re-cov-

ering, Jan explains.

Hides have to be matched and patterns designed if a bi-colored skin is to be used. Making an edge from a skin complete with hair

is an art. Conventional sewing methods leave a sharp edge. Jan blends skins, shapes edges and does her best to make an invisible seam. Smooth leather is not only delicate but extremely costly (\$4 to \$6 a square foot). A mistake
