The official vote count in last week's provincial election widened the gap between the successful Liberal candidate Julian Reed and the defeated PC candidate Fran Baines. Reed's plurality now stands at 518, rather than the 494 unofficial count election night.

Reed picked up 88 votes for a total of 13,395. Baines added 64 votes for a total of 12,877 and NDP candidate Chris Cutler increased his total by 15 to 3,500.

In all 29,965 votes were cast, with 105 rejected. Forty-eight ballots were unmarked and in an unusual occurrence 40 ballots were declined. This means 40 voters

accepted their ballots then returned them saying they did not want to vote for any of the candidates.

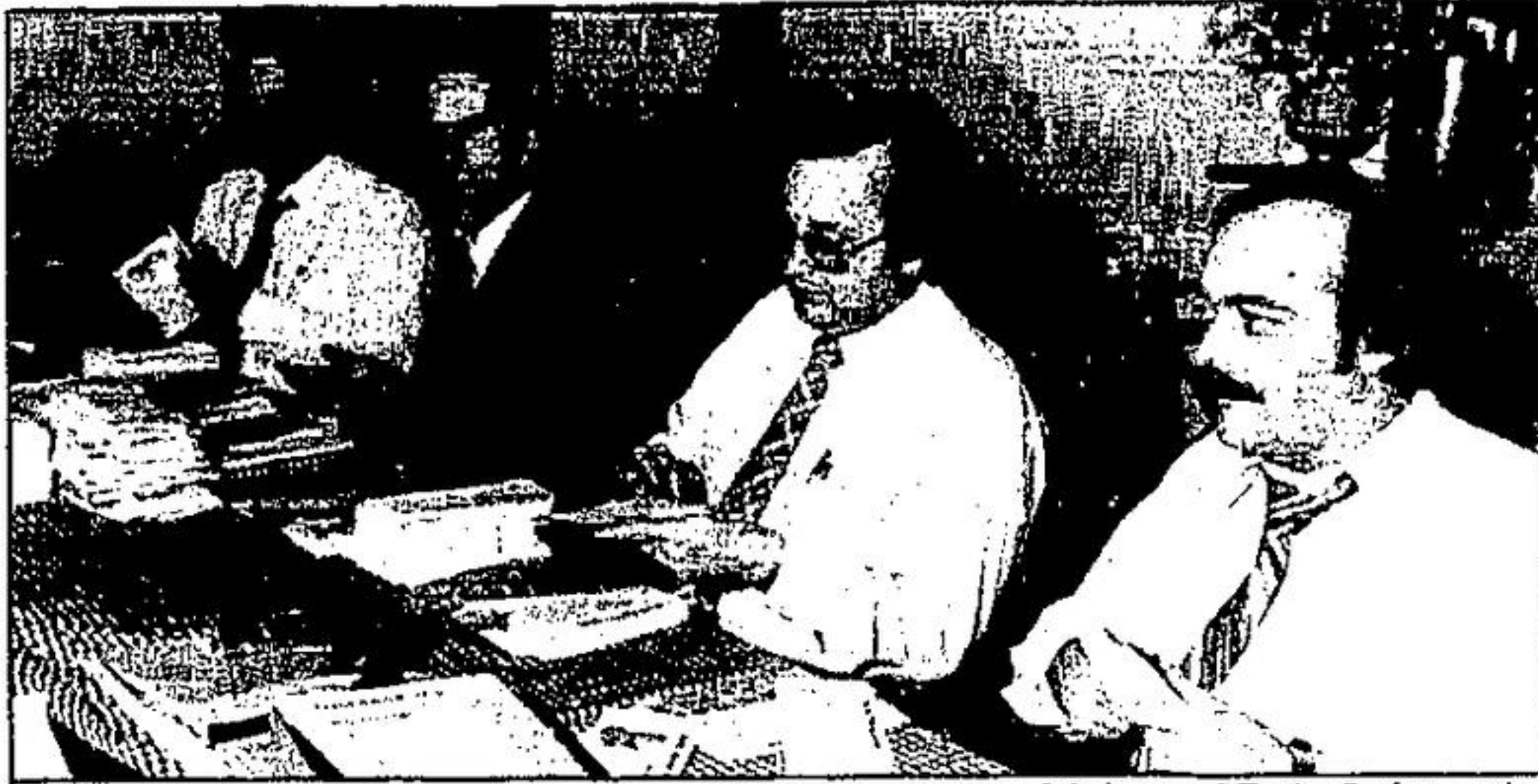
With 53,198 eligible voters in Halton-Burlington riding, 29,965 or 56.4 per cent of the voters turned out Thursday.

Reed won 12 Acton polls while Baines took four, including the advance poll. Cutler was last in all but one of the 16 polls.

Baines captured four Esquesing polls and tied Reed in one other. The victorious incumbent won the other 18 rural Halton Hills polls.

Reed won six of the eight north Nassagaweya polls.

Not so claims Trinity United Church member Eldon Comfort. He missed Friday's meeting with Bell because of a funeral. It was, however, his letter that urged a change of bank, which sparked the local issue.

"The real reason is that it's profitable to do business with South Africa," said Comfort. The rural Acton resident went on to indicate that banks make the assumption that if they do business with a government, such as South Africa's, some benefit will "trickle down" to the Blacks.

"It just doesn't work. The power structure has not changed with the trickle down theory," said Comfort.

**Citizen of Year
set for June 27**

The 1981 Acton Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year will be honored at a dinner-dance on June 27.

In an effort to build more interest in the Citizen of the Year program it is being made part of the big Back to Acton Days celebrations.

Previously Citizen of the Year nominations were made in late February and early March, the Chamber's selection for the award revealed late in March and a dinner-dance honoring the recipient held in April.

Dave Whiting, who is organizing the Citizen of the Year program said the affair will be held at the Acton Curling Club. There will be a cocktail hour, dinner presentations and dance. Whiting predicted having the Citizen of the Year the same weekend, but as a separate function, as Back to Acton Days will result in a larger attendance.
