Johnson sweeps all but 12 polls

Veteran Conservative MPP Jack Johnson swept all but 12 polls to win Wellington-Dufferin-Peel riding in Thursday's election.

There are 176 polls in the riding.

Johnson attracted 18,647 votes for the PCs while Liberal Elbert van Donkersgoed got 8,127 and NDPer Marion Chambers secured 4,650.

There were more eligible voters this time, however, about 2,000 fewer people cast ballots. Thursday 58.18 per cent of the 50,572 eligible voters got to the polls. There was a total of 29,242 ballots.

In 1977 there were 31,231 voters to the 46,325 eligible voters for a 67.41 per cent turnout.

Johnson, in his third election, won every poll in Erin Village and all but one in Erin Township. Chambers won poll 96 in the township. It is a

neighbor to her home poll. Johnson, 50, also cleaned up Eramosa Township including Rockwood and Eden Mills.

LACAC bylaw

An old hotel, a school and a number of churches have come under the Eramosa Local Architectural Conservancy Advisory Committee's (LACAC) umbrella.

Eramosa Township Council Monday passed a resolution which protects the home of Rockwood founder Henry Strange, Rockwood Academy, Rockwood cemetery, Eden Mills Hotel facade

and the following churches: St. John the Evangelist in Rockwood, St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church and Speedside United Church.

LACAC representative Betty Lou Clark told council it is placing a 90-day freeze on all changes to the structures "so there is time to find some ways to see if it (any problem) can be resolved."
