Laing starts OMHA finals tonight . . .

(Continued from B1) Beamsville in the semi-finals last week in four games. In between series Laing picked up two more wins in the Hub league round robin play-offs, making them almost a sure bet for the Champions Day April 5 in Waterloo, and competed in the Port Colborne tournament. There they captured a 5-1 victory over Niagara-on-the-Lake in the first match of the tourney Friday night, but lost the second game 2-1 to the eventual champions, Stoneybrook. Friday Laing forwards forced play in the opposing end, resulting in five goals. The first came from Carl Yaroschak just 36 seconds into the game,

on a pass from Craig Cadenhead. Cadenhead and Yaroschak teamed again at 7:39 of the first to connect on the second goal. Todd Lazenby made it 3-0 at 1:49 of the second stanza. Yaroschak and Frank Katsillieris picked up the aids. Niagara-on-the-Lake made a brief comeback early in the third scoring to make it 3-1 at 1:52. But Yaroschak's third goal unassisted at 2:40 put the game out of reach and with John Van Dam's marker at 9:58, Laing clinched the win. Lee Yaroschak and Rob Murray assisted on the play. Laing outshot Stoneybrook in the second game Saturday but couldn't capitalize on their scoring chances. Stoneybrook scored twice on fluke goals in the second and third periods. Troy Foster was the lone Acton marksman, potting the first goal at 5:15 of the opening frame. Murray and Lee Yaroschak assisted. Back in Hub, Laing pocketed a pair of decisive victories, blasting Fergus 7-1 Thursday and closing out New Ham-

burg 5-0 Monday. Laing dominated play Thursday, completely outplaying Fergus. But they could only manage a single goal in the opening stanza from Murray at 4:17. Greg Leatherland earned the bracket. Fergus's goal late in the second frame on the powerplay seemed to spark Laing. They quickly got one back, with Van Dam scoring at 8:02. Leatherland potted one a few seconds later at 8:23, assisted by Van Dam. Yaroschak netted the fourth goal seven seconds after that, followed by Cadenhead's marker at 9:08, aided by Yaroschak. They scored four goals in the space of one minute and six seconds all while short-handed on the same penalty. From then on the atoms took control of the game. They closed in for the kill in the third frame, with Cadenhead and Foster on the powerplay at 4:13 completing the tally. Wayne MacEachern, Paul Campbell and Lazenby assisted. David Hinz added another shutout to his

credit in the 5-0 victory over New Hamburg Monday. Yaroschak opened the scoring at 1:33 on the first frame. Cadenhead made it 2-0 at 8:04 on a short-handed goal. The second period remained scoreless; it wasn't until 7:10 of the third that Leatherland increased Laing's lead to three goals. Lazenby and Cadenhead with his second goal, rounded out the scoring. Yaroschak, Lazenby, Cadenhead, Jason Henderson, Murray and Katsillieris pocketed assists. OMHA finals continue tomorrow with Laing travelling to Elmira for the second game.
