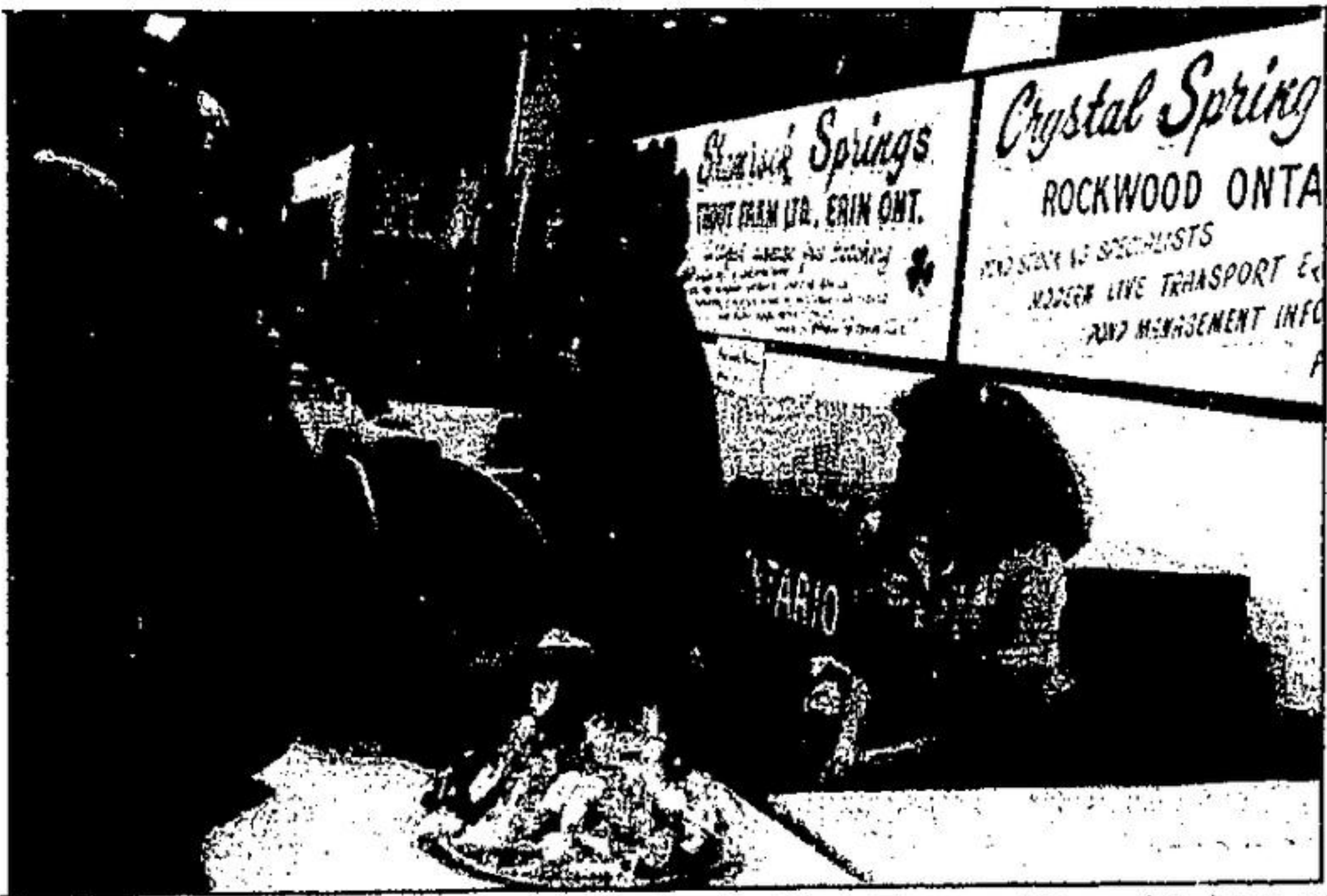

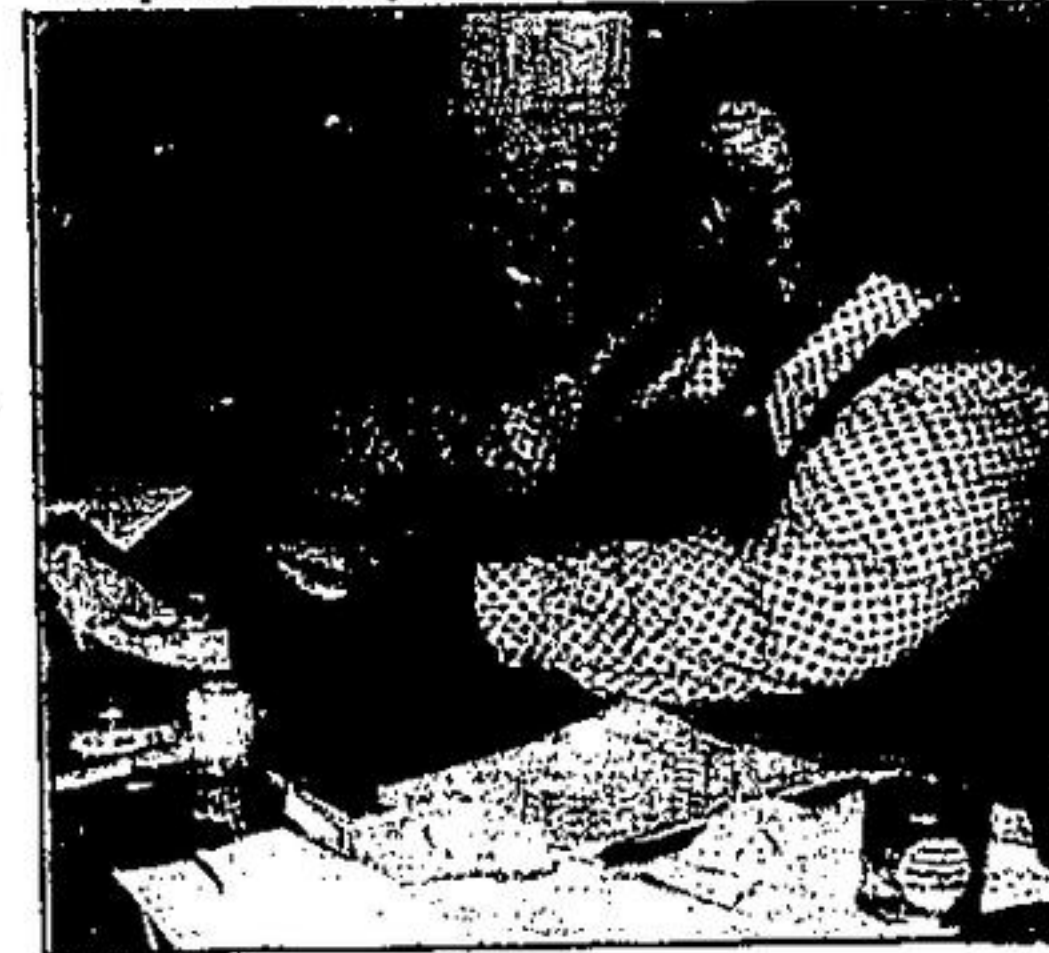
Villagers are reminded of SPIN. Please leave it before 12 a.m. as that is pick-up time. This is on the first Saturday of the month.
