Farmer gone

A town staff report is expected to be presented soon concerning potential leaks of explosive methane gas from the closed Acton dump.

Halton Hills engineering staff have conducted some monitoring of the dump, on Churchill Road, and discussions have been held with the provincial ministry of the environment concerning further action.

A report is to be made in a few weeks.

The province tested the site in October and determined that there were no leaks. However, further precautionary tests were recommended.

A 44-year-old Halton Hills trucker and ex-Milton police officer testified yesterday he was struck with a billy club by a Milton police officer during an alleged unlawful arrest at Fifth Wheel Truck Stop.

Russel Connor of First Line, Acton, a self-employed haulage operator, is suing Halton Regional Police and three members of its department for false arrest and claiming damage as a result of injuries suffered in the incident nearly two years ago.

The case, which is being heard in Milton County Court by Judge Thomas Quinlan, began Monday with testimony from Mr. Connor.

He told the court and jury of six that on June 28 at approximately 12.30 a.m. he was forced into a police cruiser following an argument with gas attendants at Fifth Wheel gas bar.

Mr. Connor said he was never told he was under arrest or why he was being taken by police officers, but

The arrest was apparently made despite the fact Mr. Connor told officers the disagreement involving a wrongful billing with the gas attendant had been straightened out to everybody's satisfaction.

Police charges against Mr. Connor for causing a disturbance and assaulting police were later dismissed in court.

A medical report by Dr. Donald Aikenhead of Milton revealed Mr. Connor suffered bruises on his arm and pain in his left shoulder. Mr. Connor also complained of pain in his neck, all

attributed to his arrest by Constables Vanclief, Rod Plant and Vince Burnett. (Mr. Burnett is no longer a member of the Halton Regional Police Force). Mr. Connor apparently was given pain killers,

which he took until August of 1979. Testimony supporting Mr. Connor's claim of injury was made by his wife Glenna, a teacher at Holy Rosary School in Milton, on Monday.
