## Harold Griffin served community for years

Mr. Griffin had an excellent memory and a keen interest in things historical. reminiscences anecdotes of times past many enlivened

of Independence, a branch of the Griffins, United Empire Loyalists, moved north to the Ningara area, founding and naming the town of Smithville in 1786. In 1838 Smith Edward Griffln came with his family to

Erin Township, and settled the farm at Lot 11, Con. 6 which became the homestead. Harold Griffin was a great-grandson of that Smith Griffin.

The funeral service was held April 2 in Churchill Community Church, with the Rev. A. W. Fosbury officiating, assisted by Rev. Robt.
