McK-Smith pulls coup claim school shinny title

A late rally from W.I. Dick Wildcats fell short which allowed Acton's McKenzie-Smith School to win 6-4 and claim the north Halton elementary school hockey championship Thursday night at Milton Sports Centre.

Acton led 4-1 heading into the final period, before Wildcats bounced back to narrow the gap. Acton pulled ahead in the late stages to secure the win.

Acton gained a small measure of revenge in defeating Wildcats. Last year, the two teams met in the final with W.I. Dick coming out on top.

But Acton made few mistakes and completed a perfect 4-0 record through the round-robin and playoff series.

Acton was led by forward Bill Morrison who powered his squad with a

fine demonstration of stickhandling and scoring ability.

Altogether, Acton outscored their opponents by a 25-11 margin and beat Wildcats twice by identical 6-4 scores.

After defeating Milton's Sam Sherratt School 7-1 in the opener, Acton advanced to the semi-finals with a 6-4 win over Wildcats. The squad then beat Georgetown's Centennial School 6-2 for

the right to move into the finals.

Wildcats had a rockier road into the championship game.

The squad split its two games, defeating Centennial 4-1 and losing to Acton before edging Stewarttown 3-2 in overtime in a dramatic semi-final.

The teams were allowed a variety of rep players depending on their school's enrolment.

Centennial wasn't allowed any, Stewarttown and W.I. Dick were allowed one each. McKenzie-Smith was allowed two and Sam Sherratt was allowed an unlimited number because of their small enrolment.

W.I. Dick's Steve Ralph was named the tournament's most valuable defensive player.

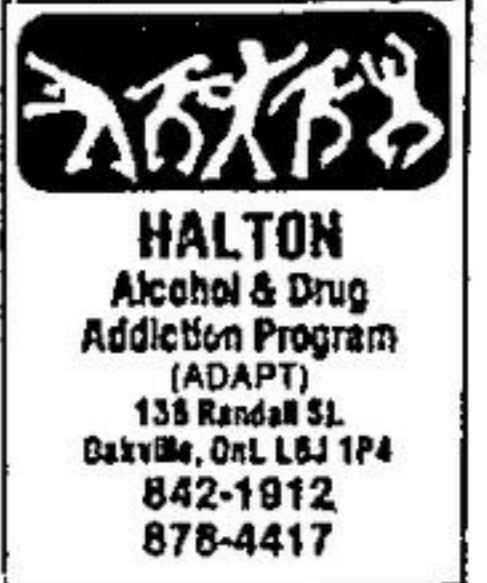
