Rockwood trustees discuss debt.

Provincial government advice is likely to figure in any method to be used by Rockwood trustees in handling the village's approximately \$7,000 deficit.

Provincial Inter-Governmental Affairs manager

Vince Bozzer, of Guelph, presented some ideas to village trustees and Eramosa Township councillors

Monday. Village trustees Rick Lewis, Jan Osborne and Jim Funk invited Bozzer to one of their meetings so they can learn details of methods they can use.

Trustees are meeting tonight to discuss one way of releasing \$8,000 from the village budget. Township clerk Lloyd Hindley outlined a suggestion that would put roads under the township's rate.

The main disadvantage to villagers with that is they would receive a hefty tax hike this year. It would amount to a \$60 tax increase on a home assessed at \$3,000. On top of that would come the

regular tax levy increase of about \$60. Sixty dollars in one year is "too high of an in-

crease", according to trustee chairman Lewis.'
Bozzer suggested trustees go through the budget

"with a fine tooth comb" to see if they are "living beyond their means".

Garbage collection is something Rockwood and other police villages undertake though they do not have the authority under the Municipal Act, according to Bozzer.

He suggested trustees check to determine if they are paying for garbage collection directly.

Police villages have to operate within a 15 mill increase limit. If trustees discover they need more mills that they can get, there was the suggestion that the municipal organization change in order to get around the limit.

Under the Municipal Act, Rockwood could in time exist as a ward within the township rather than as a police village. According to township reeve Bill Adsett there could be an advantage in that, especially when it includes the sharing of personnel.

"We will check with the solicitor about arranging the money," trustee Jim Funk told township couneil, "Maybe we won't lose the identity."

"As far as your deficit is concerned, it's not something you should be carrying from year to year," sald Bozzer. Rockwood's had a deficit for at least four years.

The main causes of the \$7,000 deficit, according to Lowis, are the frontage costs on property the village owns and the sewer and water services to the village office.

Rockwood trustees will soon have to make decisions because the village's budget affects the township's budget. And the township has to have its budget set in May so the bills can be mailed in June.

Eden Mills, the other police village in Eramosa, also had a problem with its budget last year. There was a surplus of about \$2,000. And a surplus, like a deficit, should not be carried from year to year.
