resurfacing, something other sports don't have to do.

He would have preferred to see a deal where the club pays operation costs or maintenance, somewhere between \$100 and \$150, plus all of hydro. Marks estimated that would have meant a total cost to the club of about \$500, less if the club and not the municipality controlled the lights.

He says no other sport must pay not just operating costs but also make capital contributions. "We believe in user pays but they (Halton Hills) are using tennis money to help pay for the rink and other recreation facilities. Tennis players are saying ouch."

The Acton Tennis Club isn't a private organization, members are the "organized public" and court time is always open to non-members.

He says the club received "limited" maintenance service from the town last year but members didn't mind sweeping courts etc. because they always did before the town said it was taking over court maintenance.

Marks emphasized while this year's agreement was "forced" on the club they really aren't upset or complaining, they just don't think the deal is as fair to tennis as it could be.
