Sixty three dogs were destroyed during the first three months of this year, a report from Animal Control Officer Joe Kirley discloses. Only 12 dogs of a total of 128 found new homes, while 53 were reclaimed by their owners. In all the control service answered 693 calls during January, February and March, compared to 745 in the same period last year.

Hugh McKinnon Reid, Acton Baptist Church deacon and Ospringe school board member, died April 10 at Guelph General Hospital in his 88th year.

Although living all his life on the Third Line of Erin, he was a recent resident of Norfolk Manor.

Born November 18, 1893, Mr. Reid married Eunice Graham May 20, 1925. He farmed until retirement in 1957 specializing in certified seed potatoes and registered grain farming. His community service included several years on the Public School Board at Ospringe and over 30 years as deacon of Acton Baptist Church.
