It all gets underway at 9 a.m. Saturday, June 27, with the callthump parade forming up in Lakeview. Becker's Plaza and Kingham and winding downtown.

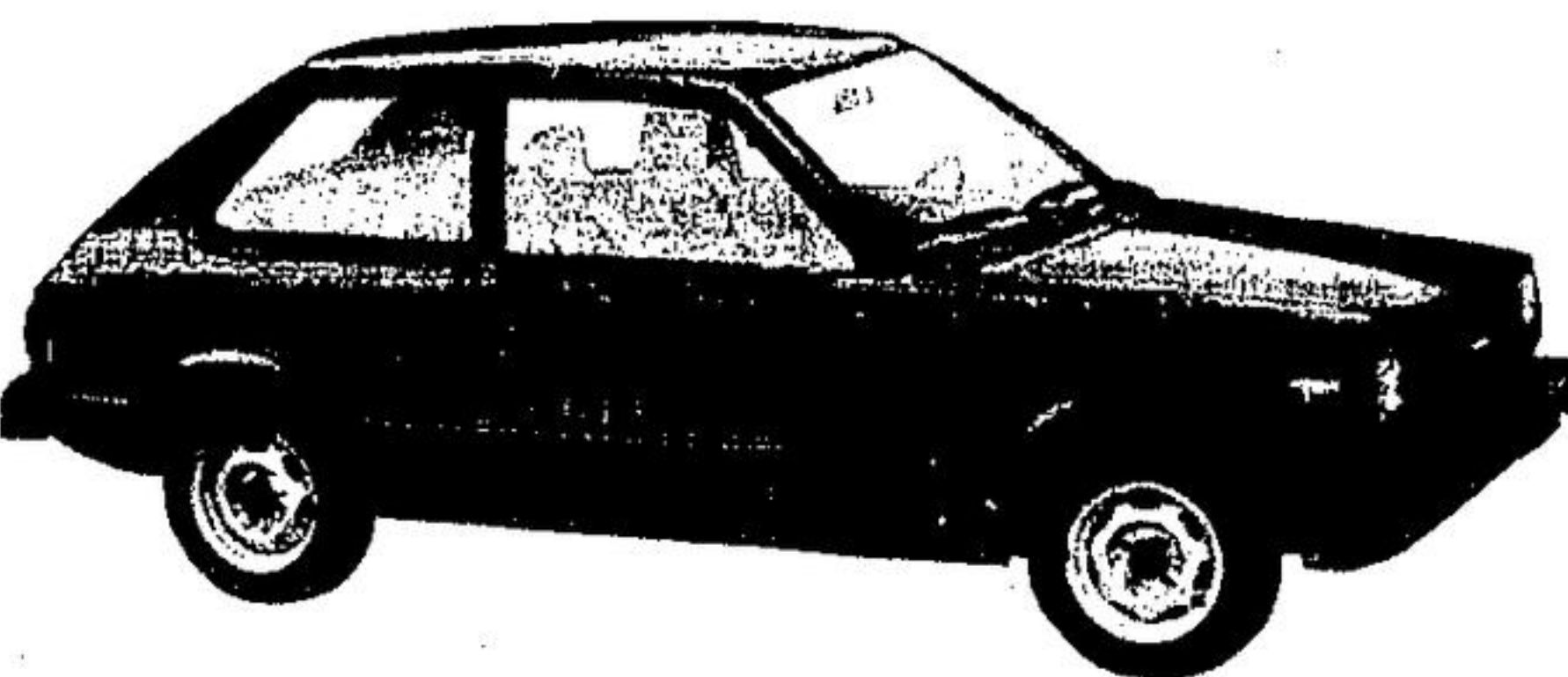
