and the hall upstairs could be used for wedding receptions and shows.

Shepard said some suggested uses for the building make it ineligible for certain grants. If the committee was interested in only finding meeting room space in the town the recreation department could easily book school classrooms for groups. Town hall restoration was an expensive project to simply provide a hall and two meeting rooms.

Committee members noted they came up with various possible uses for the hall because they were told this would be needed for grants. They weren't committed to any specific uses for the building.

Some spending to save the building for its historical "uniqueness" could be justified, Shepard said.

It had been hoped a grant of \$70,000 could be secured from the Heritage Foundation, but that is up in the air. Shepard said the town hall lost a lot of its historical value because the way the fire hall was joined to the town hall. He said the committee couldn't count on receiving \$70,000—half that amount if they were lucky. The Heritage Foundation wants to know full plans for both the exterior and interior of the hall because one wall has already been "messed up".

Shepard concluded there is a "wide gap" in funding which must be closed for full restoration.

He said there's a "misconception" on how easy grants are to secure and suggested the committee should be looking at saving the building by restoring the exterior and then look at interior restoration in future years.

If the municipality can find a way to plan the hall as a community centre with two rooms and a hall which can be booked some grants can still be secured, he noted.

Elliott observed the building is still standing four years after it was to be demolished so something has been accomplished.
