Top 21 qualify for Peel-Haltons

Acton High School sent 21 athletes to the Peel-Halton track and field championships yesterday (Tuesday) at Etobicoke Olympia after qualifying with top showings at the Haltons a week earlier.

AHS captured three events, as well as placed second in five more and nabbed a

George Gidman placed first in the junior boys 400 metre run with a time of 53 seconds. He also took fifth in the junior boys 800 at 2.08 minutes, qualifying for the Peel-Halton's in both.

Clifford Nibbs won the midget boys long jump with a leap of 5.30 metres, as well as finishing fifth in the midget boys 100 metre at 12.3 seconds, while the junior boys relay team of Mike Mooney, Les Doblsz, Gldman and Nibbs were tops in the 4 x 100 relay with a time of 47 seconds.

Gord March also had a strong showing with two second place finishes in both the midget boys 400 and 200 metre runs. He finished the 200 metre in 25.4 seconds.

Dobisz placed second in the junior boys triple jump at 11.50 metres, while Don Weaver placed second in junior boys pole vaulting with a nine metre leap.

Norman Bourassa also came second in the senior boys pole vault at 9.4 while Sandra Brundle came third in the junior girls javelin with a toss of 28,55 metres. All qualified for yesterday's meet.

Other qualifiers were Rick Dodds, Dobisz, Kay Duess, Andrea Arbic, Carrie Kerton, Linda Osso, Rick Papillon and

Debbie Baum. Dodds placed sixth in both the midget boys shotput and 600 metre run. Papillon placed sixth in junior boys shotput at 7.80 while Dobisz placed fourth in the junior boys 100 metre fun at 11.6 seconds.

Duess finished fourth in the senior girls 3,000 metre with 14.25 minutes, and in the javelin with a toss of 21.09.

Osso placed fifth in the junior girls shotput, tossing it 8.17 metres and sixth in the discus at 22.50.

Arble came fourth in midget girls' javelin at 25.71, while Kerton placed sixth at 24.66. Baum qualified in the midget girls discus, finishing fourth at 20.80 metres. She also competed in the midget girls shotput but failed to qualify.

Tom McDonough finished fifth behind Doblsz in the junior boys 100 metre at 11.7 seconds, but missed out on the qualifications. Other competitors who failed to qualify included Andrea Jenkinson who came seventh at 25.88 in junior girl's javelin, and ninth in discus at 20.20.

Teresa Dunn, Judy Vetricek, Shirley Van Rike competed in the midget and junior girls long jump, while Mooney competed in junior boys. Papillon and Paul Nolan failed to qualify in the junior boys discus and Debbie Pane, who placed ninth, did not advance in midget girls discus.

As well, the midget girl relay team of Sally Briggs, Arbic, Mandy Slicocks and Dunn placed seventh in the 4 x 100 while the juntor boys failed in the 4 x 100 metre relay.

The Peel-Haltons were held yesterday at Etoblooke with results unavailable by press time. Top finishers there will go on to the regionals next Thursday, May 28.

Bray, Astros honored at town's recognition night

Several local athletes and an entire minor soccer team were honored last Wednesday at the Halton Hills Honor and Recognition night at Gordon Alcott arena in George-

Mark Bray, Teresa Dunn, Mark Beaton, Don Coats, Dave Hobden, Sylvia Mages of Acton and Sara Aggiss of Limehouse as well as the Acton Astros peewee soccer team were given Halton Hills pins and certificates for their achievements.

Several local people involved in cultural activities were honored as well as athletes. and artists from Georgetown.

Swimmer Mark Bray was honored for his performance on the Ontario all-star swim team in 1980. He also swam on the national team and travelled to Helldburg, Germany for an international meet.

There the national team defeated both West Germany and Russia.

Bray was ranked second in Canada in the 100 metre butterfly and the 50 metre freestyle last year and third in the 200 butterfly. He was also ranked in the top 10 in all other swimming events.

At the provincials he won five gold medals and at the division two nationals held in Montreal, he ranked third in

It's the second time Bray was honored for his outstanding feats. Last year he won the Royal Bank Trophy as Halton Hills Athlete of the Year 1980.

Sara Aggis of Limehouse, has been competing in gymnastics at various levels since 1973, presently with the Cambridge Kips. During 1980 she passed national level testing for one, two and three, placed eighth at the Canadian Selection meet In February, fourth in the Ontario senior provincials in April and 10th at the Richard Kilpatrick Sr. (manager), Burt
