

# AHS sends relay to regionals

Two athletes and the junior boys relay team qualified for the Ontario regionals in high school track and field with their performances at the Halton-Peel championships last Tuesday in Etobicoke.

George Gidman and Norm Bourassa of Acton High School qualified for the junior boys 400 metre race and the senior boys pole vaulting with their placings at the Halton-Peel.

As expected, the junior boys relay team of Gidman, Mike Mooney, Clifford Nibbs and Les Dobisz qualified for the regionals, held yesterday, in the 4 x 100 metre relay.

Results of the regionals, held at McMaster University yesterday (Tuesday) were unavailable at press time. Athletes qualifying there will advance to the Ontario (OFSSAA) championships.

Gidman, Bourassa and the relay squad were just three of 21 Acton athletes entered in the Halton-Peel.

Gidman placed third at 52.9 seconds in the 400 metre. Bourassa placed fourth in pole vault with a height of 9.50 feet. The relay team placed fourth in the 4 x 100 at 48.7 seconds.

Other top competitors who did not qualify were Nibbs in the midget boys long jump—he placed sixth; Gord March, who finished fifth in the midget boys 200 and 400 metre runs, Sandra Brundie who placed sixth in the junior girls javelin and Debbie Baum in midget girls discus.

Rick Dodds placed sixth in the midget boys shot put and in the 800 metre run. Kay Dues placed ninth in the senior

girls javelin at 22.45 and seventh in the 3,000 metre run. Carrie Kirton took eighth in the midget girls javelin, tossing it 24.47 while Andrea Arbic finished behind her in 10th at 23.18. Linda Osso was in the top 10

in junior girls shotput at 8.29 and discus. Dobisz also competed in the junior boys triple jump, finishing 10th at 11.01 while Don Weaver, who qualified for the Halton Peel's did not compete.
