#### Church marks its 143rd anniversary

Anniversary services were held at Churchill Community Church on Sunday, May 31, celebrating 143 years that the little white church on the hill has been a centre of worship.

Rev. Emrys Jenkins introduced the guest speaker, his friend, James Taylor, retiring managing editor of the United Church Observer. Mr. Taylor's theme in the morning was brotherly

love as demonstrated by one's active concern for the poor and needy in other countries as well as our

Anniversaries are a time, not only for looking back, but also for making plans.

He likened the modern Christian's enthusiastic and enlightened participation in God's plan for the

world to the fervor of the disciples at Pentecost. Mr. Taylor continued in the same vein at the even-

ing service as he commented on pictures filmed in Nyassaland, Brazil and Halti.

He pointed out the contrast between the lives of the rich and the poor in these countries, and showed how the church in its mission program is assisting poverty-striken villagers to work together to supply clean water, to work the land and to market their produce co-operatively, and to conduct a fishing operation collectively.

Mr. Taylor has visited these areas, so spoke knowledgeably of conditions there, and the slides were most explicit-altogether an excellent

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS THE ONTARID WEED ACT as it applies to persons in possession of land within

the Town of Halton Hills, Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by JUNE 8th, 1981, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their poliens. The Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owner and collected in the manner of Municipal Taxes.

Goatsbeard, Thisties, Chicory, Poison Ivy, Ragweed, Wild Carrot, and Milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding Dandellon and Goldenrod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of the Weed Control Act. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.
