Fertilizing Your Lawn

Uniform application is the key to spreading fertilizer. Use a fertilizer spreader filled with half the total amount to cover the length of your lawn, then cover the width with the other half.
 After spreading fertilizer, water the lawn thoroughly to speed up the uptake of plant food by the grass. Do not, however, apply fertilizer to grass wet with dew or rain.
 Remember that more than one feeding is needed over the summer for a healthy lawn this year and next. The first application should be early in the spring, just before growth starts (late March or early April). One or two spreadings are required during June and July and finally a Fall Fertilizer (3-5-12) should go on in September or early October.

Seeding a New Lawn

Late August to early September is the best time to sow a new lawn. Make sure a fine firm seed bed is prepared. After applying the total required quantity of seed (approx. 1.5-2.5 kg of seed per 100m²) in two applications, rake lightly to just cover the seed. Now give a thorough but gentle sprinkling. Until the grass growth is well underway, it is important to keep the seeded area moist, but not saturated. Once the grass is well established, heavier waterings help the roots to penetrate deeper into the soil.

Repairing Winter Damage

In small areas where grass has died out over winter, early spring repair can restore damaged spots. Use a 3-pronged cultivator or steel toothed rake to vigorously rake up the dead grass and rough-up the soil. After spreading a layer of top soil or moistened peat moss, spread by hand a sufficient quantity of lawn seed. Cover the seed by very gently raking with a spring toothed rake, then mist gently with water. Water daily until the grass is well established.
