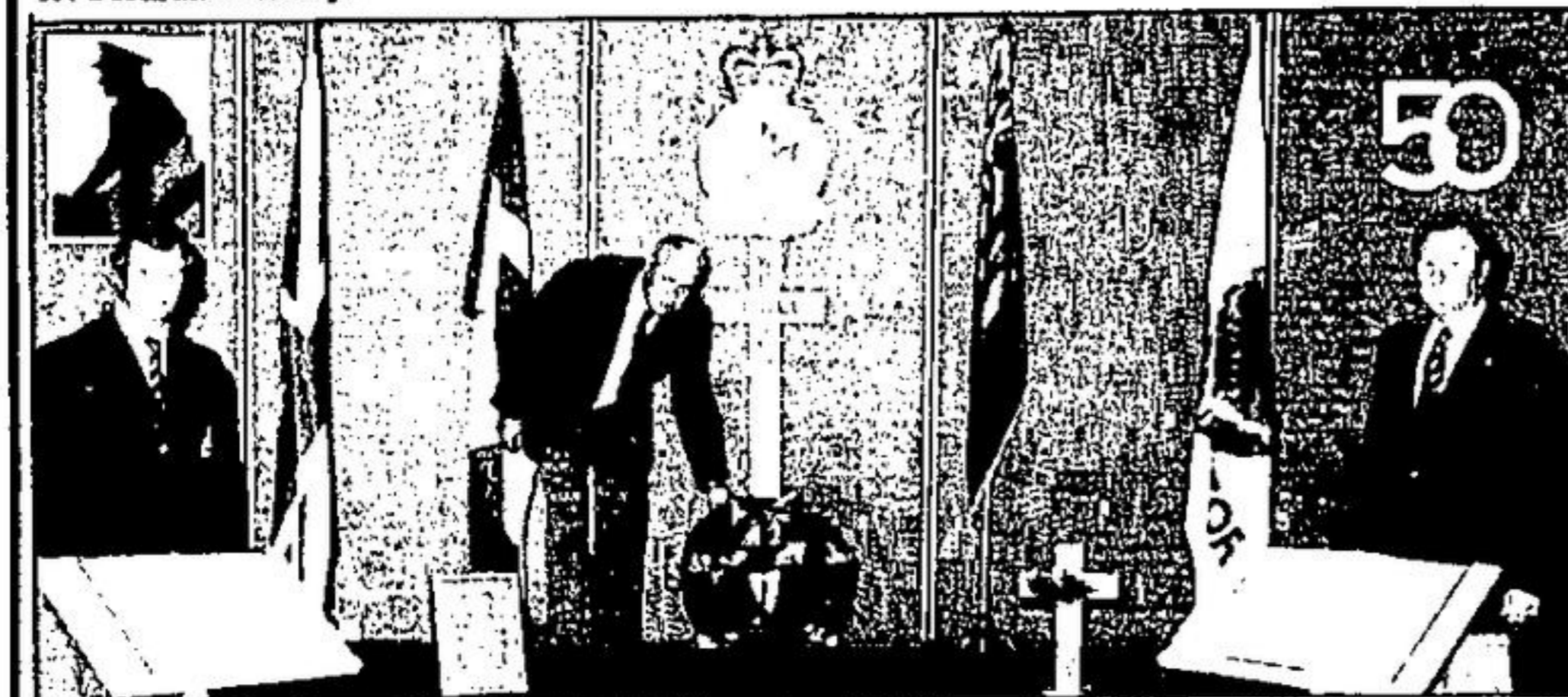

Home economics teacher

Marjorie White retires

About 50 colleagues, former students and friends gathered Thursday in the Gary Dawkins Memorial Library at McKenzie-Smith Middle School to pay tribute to Marjorie White and her 23 year career teaching in Acton and area schools.

Home economics and science teacher at McKenzie-Smith, Mrs. White and her husband Glen were presented with deck chairs for their retirement home on the Bay of Quinte near Belleville. Mrs. White leaves the teaching profession at the end of June.

Previously she also taught at Robert Little, M.Z. Bennett and Brookville schools. At one point she was teaching home economics at all the area schools.

Originally from Brockville, Mrs. White taught there and in Chesterville for four years before coming to Acton.

She recalled for the audience of admirers being invited to teach in Acton by Pat McKenzie and Billy Middleton and they talked her out of going to Milton with the pay that Acton's air was fresher because of the town's elevation. She joked they never mentioned the tannery.

"Acton was good to us," she said, noting they'll miss the town a lot and were "very happy here."

In an interview Mrs. White observed schools have become more permissive so it has become more difficult to teach. But at the same time the courses are more interesting for the students.

Principal John Simpson observed the large crowd on hand for the tea was a tribute to Mrs. White's impact on the community.

McKenzie said it was a "privilege and pleasure" to have taught with Mrs. White.

Yugoslav centre

Opposing nationalities united in Halton Hills

The Canadian-Yugoslav Cultural Association "Brotherhood & Unity" (CYCA) is one step closer to developing a huge picnic grounds where once-adversaries will meet as friends.

Nick Cajic, of the CYCA, attended Halton Hills council Monday explaining that in order to obtain a liquor licence from the LCBO for the 97 acre property on Highway 25, south of Acton, his organization needed the permission of town council.

The liquor licence would be a year round necessity.

Cajic denied creating a political situation, even though the various Yugoslav nationalities

are encompassed within his organization. He did not feel there would be any problem with the Croatan Centre south of Norval.

He foresees no political problems, but said "They (the Croats) are more

fanatical than us," He added those interested in politics won't be welcome.

Councillor Harry Levy was concerned about the possibility of Halton Hills being a battleground, Cajic denied this.

Levy asked what controls are being taken to control the activities. He was not satisfied with Cajic's reply that the area was under populated and activities would be taking place at least 1,000 feet from the road.

Council agreed to give Cajic a letter of permission to give to the liquor control board. The site will draw people from Toronto, Hamilton, Kitchener, Windsor and London.
