## Council way of one United Way

Individual United Ways should be set up in Hallon Hills, Milton and Burlington by 1983 and an overall United Way for the whole of Halton by 1985, states a recommendation by Halton Regional Social Planning Council.

The idea put forward by a voluntary funding study met with a cool reception by Halton Hills general committee, which decided to send copies of the report to agencies in town for their comments.

The reports also asked council to approve the

establishment of a committee to implement the recommendation so a Halton United Way could be established.

Mayor Pete Pomeroy pointed out the people who are raising money themselves in town have not been heard from. "We could be hurting local agencies, so I would like to know how this would affect them."

Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson suggested the report be sent to the

groups and have them reply by October. "This would be a major change for our community, and probably in the first few years there wouldn't be much money raised," she commented.

Councillor Dave Whiting said he found the report inaccurate when he first read it at regional council. He noted it stated the Acton Chamber of Commerce raised \$1,700. "That is inaccurate."
